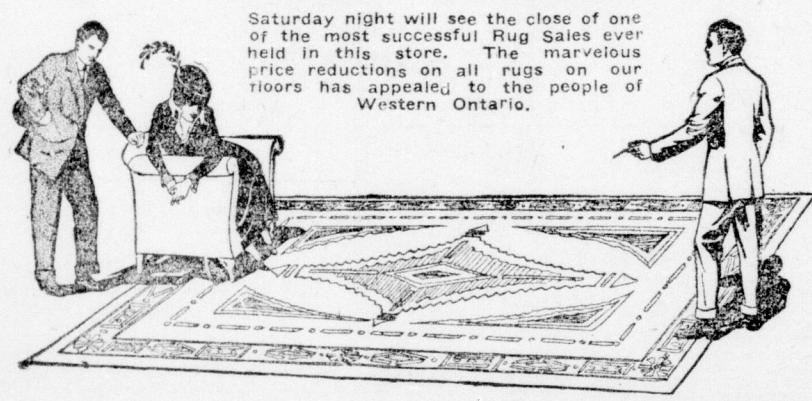

Western University Term Opening On Oct. 1 In All Branches Gives Promise Of Great Results---Faculty Strengthened

Brilliant Professors Have Been Added This Year, While Local Men Will Assist Institution by Delivering Part-Time Lectures—Staff Members Reporting Monday for Term's Work—Educational Possibilities Enhanced by New Appointments.

The new year at the Western University, which begins a week from Monday, promises to be by far the best in its history as far as the quality of the work to be undertaken is concerned. The strength of an educational institution depends more upon its faculty than upon anything else. The local university has sought out some of the ablest specialists who can be found anywhere, and the new men who are to be attached to the arts faculty this fall have no superior in any Canadian university. Lectures will begin in both the arts and medical departments, October 2, the registration of students taking place the previous day. The supplemental examinations for students who failed in any of their subjects last spring will be held next week, beginning on Tuesday. It is too early to forecast the probable

enrollment for the coming year. It is evident, however, that while war conditions are certain to continue to interfere with an attendance such as would otherwise be registered, there will nevertheless be sufficient students of a high calibre to warrant the expectation of a year's work of the highest order.

Enjoys Great Reputation. Dr. Arthur Livingston, who expects to arrive in the next month from New York preparatory to entering upon his duties as professor of romance languages, is considered one of the two ablest men in his department at Columbia University. He has enjoyed a distinction of being one of the outstanding universities of the United States. He is one of the most voluminous contributors to the Romance magazines of Europe and America. He has also published two or three important books which have given him a place in the front rank of scholars. His latest and most important volume in the course of preparation, which scholars say that it will further add to his reputation as a profound and efficient contributor to knowledge. He is also said to be a remarkable teacher, full of enthusiasm and an inspiration to his pupils. As a student at Columbia, Dr. Livingston enjoyed a high reputation in his department, and as soon as he obtained his doctor's degree there, the university immediately attached him to its faculty, where he has rapidly risen to the highest place. Previous to his special work at Columbia, he had studied and traveled extensively abroad.

In Dr. William O. Brewster Fox, the Western University is fortunate in bringing back to Canada one of its native sons. A graduate of McMaster and a former professor of classics at Brandon College, Professor Fox was not satisfied with climbing to the highest place possible in his profession. He spent several years in special study at Geneva, Rome, Athens and Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, receiving his doctor's degree at the last-named institution, and then joining the faculty at Princeton.

Dr. Fox has likewise done a great deal in research and authorship. His recent six-dollar volume on Roman and Greek Mythology is said by Dr. J. H. Robinson of Baltimore, one of the leading American archaeologists, to be the best book in English on the subject, although there are in existence a large number of books on classical mythology. Dr. Fox also enjoys the distinction of having discovered a difficult inscription in Latin text on the tablets, which had been given up as hopeless by the most eminent European scholars. Professor Capps, head of the department at Princeton, says of Dr. Fox's volume: "He is the most adaptable and the teacher of all our assistant professors."

Means Much to London. It is planned to add another professor of mathematics, Dr. Ford of the University of Michigan was expected to accept this position and acceptance of the invitation is expected every day. It is a great thing for London and for the interests of higher education in this part of the province that men of such distinction should be attached to the faculty. The advantages of close contact with scholars of this kind and the other able men of our faculties, our students will have excellent opportunities of carrying forward their work.

Part-Time Lecturers. A valuable part of the work at the Western University has been the linking up of able local men for single courses of lectures on subjects in which they have specialized. One of the men who will assist the regular faculty this coming year is J. P. London, B.A., who will give a course of lectures on "United States History." London is a native of London, was educated in the city schools, and graduated from Western in law, taking some honor work in all the years of his course and winning a prize in English graduation. Since that time he has been on the editorial staff of the Free Press, and about a year ago was appointed librarian in succession to W. O. Carson, who is now inpector of libraries for the province. During all these years, Mr. London has been using his time in special investigation of United States and Canadian history, in which he has become quite an authority. His course on the constitution and history of the United States is sure to be one of the valuable courses for the coming year. Another of the part-time lecturers is the year 1917-18 will be Duncan McArthur, M.A., who will give the lectures on "The Philosophy of Mr. McArthur is a native of Elgin County, and had a brilliant career at Queen's University, Ottawa, where he took a considerable part in association with Mr. Doughty and Professor Adam Short in producing the important 24-volume work on "Canadian History." He is the author of a large part of the third and fourth volumes of this work, covering political and social history of the provinces of Canada as well as the history of public finances from 1793 onwards. The recent volume of the "History of the City" enables the Western University to avail itself of a local and able teacher who is also an enthusiastic teacher.

Recent Graduates. The students who have recently graduated from the Western University have practically all secured important positions or are engaged in such other work that their influence will be widely felt in various parts of the country. Of those who will pursue their studies elsewhere Mr. F. H. Curran, a graduate of the honor department of political science of the year 1917, has been offered and has accepted a prominent teaching and research fellowship in political science in the graduate school of Cornell University. He will specialize in the field of corporation finance under the guidance of Professor Allan A. Young, one of the leading authorities of the United States. Mr. Curran's time at Cornell will be devoted to his studies and research in political science in the pursuit of a higher degree. S. P. Martin and S. R. Hiss will study theology at the Montreal Methodist College. Mr. Elgie will be engaged in the study of law.

Of those who will be engaged in teaching, Miss M. P. Wells at Cambridge, while Miss L. O. Gaiser will be principal of the Protestant Community School, and Miss N. J. Cousins will be on the staff at Bothwell. Miss Edna Holland and Miss M. Curran are on the substitute staff in the city, and Miss Mary Kenna will occupy a similar position at Ingersoll.

A number of the recent graduates will be engaged in military service. J. C. Mitchell is a lieutenant in the Royal Artillery, Harold Payne is a sergeant in the 25th Battalion. S. Ritchie and W. C. Martin are both with No. 10 Stationary Hospital at Basle, Switzerland, while a large number of graduates are serving in various units.

Of those who have taken positions in the church, C. L. Langford is rector of the First Anglican Church, Owen Sound, R. J. Young is rector at Thamesville, E. H. Stephenson at Deseronto; N. H. Mills at Galt; J. H. Whelan at St. Catharines; and A. A. McArthur is pastor of a Presbyterian church at Dublin, but has recently been in military service at Malta, and Rev. Archer Wallace is pastor at Berkeley Street Methodist Church, Toronto.

Library Additions. Much greater attention is being given in recent years to enlarging the libraries than formerly. The addition of books made last year was by far the largest made in any year in the history of the university. The same policy is to be continued during this and subsequent years. In the meantime a valuable contribution had been made to the library during the past summer by J. H. Fowler's contribution of about one hundred and fifty volumes, including The World's Greatest Literature (50 vols.), The World's Works (8 vols.), Emerson Works (10 vols.), Memoirs of the Courts of Europe (1 vols.), besides a large number of important single volumes such as Driver's Introduction to the Old Testament, McCurdy's History, Prehistory and Archaeology, Green's Prolegomena to Ethics, etc. This gift to the library is greatly appreciated.

GETTING SCARED

Amsterdam, Sept. 20.—According to the Berlin Vorwarts, the following manifesto has been circulated throughout Germany:

"Citizens! The Fatherland is in peril. It is in worse peril than three years ago. Today the enemy is in our midst, and he is at work."

The newspaper adds: "It is not enough that the whole world is fighting us. The men who are responsible for this manifesto being issued also want to war against their own people. The civilian truce is over. Let us have a civilian war! Very well, let them have it! But the Reichstag must see to it that nothing shall interfere with the people's defence against the civil war agitators."

HOME CANNING IS NOT AFFECTED BY GOVT. REGULATION

Hanover People Refused to Put Up Supplies of Fruit.

TORONTO, Sept. 20.—Because they had heard that the food controller had ordered the confiscation of all canned fruit and vegetables over 50 pint jars per family, the people of Hanover, Ont., have refused to do any canning under circumstances. One of the citizens wired Dr. A. H. Abbott, secretary of the organization of resources committee, asking for confirmation or denial of the rumor. Dr. Abbott wired back that while the order-in-council of August 24 prohibited the sale and purchase of certain canned vegetables there had never been any suggestion of confiscation, the idea being to compel the use of fresh vegetables. The regulation does not affect the use of privately canned goods.

SOLD FINE FARM.

GLADSTONE, Sept. 20.—Steven Trumskill has sold his estate, consisting of 80 acres, to Douglas Madole, and purchased from the executor of the estate of the late Alex. Brodie 100 acres for \$3,750. Possession will be given in April next.

FOUR FRENCH SHIPS LOST. PARIS, Sept. 20.—Two French merchantmen of more than 1,000 tons and two vessels of less than that tonnage were sunk by Teuton submarines or mines in the week ended September 19, according to an official statement given out today by the French administration.

MONTEVIDEANS INDIGNANT. MONTEVIDEO, Sept. 20.—Upwards of 20,000 men marched through the principal streets of Montevideo last night to register their protest against the action of the German minister to Argentina, Count von Luxburg, in sending either telegram through the Swedish legation at Buenos Ayres, in which he suggested that Argentinian vessels be "sunk without a trace."
