## CARPENTIER AND HIS SEVENTEEN-YEAR-OLD BRIDE ARRIVE IN N. Y.

French Champion Receives a  
Rousing Welcome On  
Landing.

New York, March 23.—Georges Carpentier, heavyweight boxing champion of Europe, who served France in the world as an aviator, arrived here today on the steamship Savoie and was cordially welcomed by a throng of sporting enthusiasts and an enthusiastic delegation from the French colony. He was accompanied by his 17-year-old bride, and his manager, Francois Descamps. It is expected that Carpentier will sign a contract to meet Jack Dempsey for the heavyweight championship of the world during his stay in this country. Many promoters have been tempting offers, but Manager Descamps has not yet indicated his probable decision. Carpentier will be entertained for several days, and then will make a trip to the Pacific Coast.

## WESTERN SOCCER ASSOCIATION TO MEET IN WOODSTOCK

WOODSTOCK, March 22.—The announcement that the annual meeting of the Western Football Association would be held in Woodstock on Good Friday, April 2, was made by Secretary-Treasurer C. O. Tatham today. The Western Association, which controls soccer in Western Ontario, has a most successful year in 1919, and indications point to an even greater season for this year. Last year, there were over thirty-five teams entered from the cities, towns and villages, and soccer received the best boom it has had for years. In the senior series Brantford (United, winners of district number one, defeated Woodstock, winners of district number two, for the championship. The local outfit hopes to make a great showing this year. Listowel battled through to final victory in the junior series and won the championship from Tavistock. The juvenile series for players of 18 years and under was an innovation, and Milverton won the championship. The famous Hough cup, emblematic of collegiate and high school championships, was successfully defended by Listowel in the spring series, but lost to Milverton in the autumn series. Some of the Western Ontario cities entered G. W. V. A. teams last season and already this year two additional G. W. V. A. teams have signified their intention of entering the competition. Woodstock veterans are out to land the pewter this season. Woodstock College, which entered the finals in the spring Hough cup series last season, have entered the first challenge for the cup. It is expected that over forty delegates will attend the annual meeting, which will be held in the Woodstock City Hall. Amendments to the constitution and election of officers for the ensuing year are the main items of business. The personnel of the present executive includes D. Forsythe, president; H. W. Brown, vice-president; both of Kitchener; F. G. Elliott of Galt, honorary secretary; C. O. Tatham, Woodstock, secretary-treasurer. Secretaries of clubs will please note that the meeting is called for 11 o'clock at the city hall.

Legislature Adjourns Discus-  
sion of Measure Till Law-  
yers Appear.

## TOLMIE WITHDRAWS BILL

Drury Agrees To Liberal Mem-  
ber's Late Voting Sug-  
gestion.

TORONTO, March 22.—The making of legislation stopped suddenly in the Legislature this afternoon, because nine of the ten lawyer members were not present. It was an act of courtesy on the part of the "lay mind" of the House, but nevertheless, the absence of the legal men held up proceedings. Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, was discussing his bill on the codification of the laws of partnership on its second reading. The Farmer-Labor and Opposition groups, none of whom were lawyers, were paying little heed. Then it came with startling suddenness to the notice of the House that the minister of agriculture, the former minister of education, had something to say.

Gazing around he saw no lawyers to grapple with this legal technique, which goes farther than line fence disputes, as he rose and called the attention of the House to it. The House didn't appreciate Mr. Raney's progress, and his first step in making the law simple to the lay mind, so it agreed with Mr. Henry, and the debate was adjourned, until such time as enough lawyers are present to "keep tab on the new laws." Premier Drury denied that the Government was talking advantage of the occasion to get the legislation through without trouble.

Ontario Lagged Behind.  
In introducing the bill, Hon. W. E. Raney, K.C., stated that Ontario lagged away behind the other provinces, and the motherland as far as codification was concerned. He explained what advantage the bill would be to lawyers and laymen alike, and read an extract of a letter received from Mr. Justice Riddell stating that "careful codification was extremely valuable."

Hon. George S. Henry took exception to the attorney-general introducing the bill. "When the chosen legal men of the Government is the only lawyer present," the Government asks the House to vote on a matter of such sweeping importance. There is not a legal critic present. We are sitting here as laymen; the legislation may be far-reaching. It looks very mild to laymen, but perhaps to a lawyer it looks different.

The premier denied that the Govern-  
ment had brought up the bill because the lawyers were absent. He was sorry that his legal friends were too busy to attend. It was on his suggestion that the attorney-general had introduced the matter, and so that the lawyers might have no cause to complain he moved that the debate on the bill be ad-  
journalled.

Liberal Amendments.  
Two amendments to the municipal act proposed by Liberal members have been anticipated by the Government, and Premier Drury informed Major J. C. Tolmie (Windsor), and W. J. Bragg

(West Durham), who had the proposed amendments, the government legislation would cover both points. Major Tolmie withdrew the bill at the second reading. It was to keep the polls open from 8 o'clock to 8 o'clock. Mr. Bragg's motion was to make the consent of municipal candidates compulsory, and that they be obliged to sign the nomination papers in the same manner as the mover and seconder of the nomination. Premier Drury said that perhaps not the exact hours suggested by Major Tolmie would be adopted, but that at any rate opportunity would be given to discuss it. Replying to Hon. Thomas Crawford, he said that the hours suggested by the latter to 7 o'clock at night were favored by him.

Includes Whole Family.  
Hon. Walter Rollo's bill to amend the municipal act places the entire family on the same footing as the head of the house in voting, providing they live at home. It means that father, mother, sons and daughters vote in municipal elections on the qualification of the head of the family. Hon. F. C. Biggs also introduced a bill which covers the objection in the present law made by Mr. Bragg. He would make it compulsory to have municipal candidates qualify as nominees, as is necessary in provincial elections. The qualifying must be done not later than the night following nomination day.

Hon. Mr. Rollo also introduced his bill doing away with property qualifications for municipal candidates.

Hon. W. E. Raney says he knows nothing of a single tax bill.

STETCHER WINS AGAIN.  
Rochester, N. Y., March 23.—Joe Stetcher, champion heavyweight wrestler, defeated John Grandavitch of Bohemia here last night in two straight falls. Stetcher won both falls with a body-scissors and arm-lock, the first in 41 minutes and 15 seconds, and the second in 12 minutes and 35 seconds.

Ed ("Strangler") Lewis defeated Jack Edwards of California, getting two falls with a leg hammer-lock, the first in 1 hour, 25 minutes, 35 seconds, and the second in 11 minutes and 40 seconds.
