LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE BECOMES MORE POPULAR

Secretary Reports Encouraging
Features in Year's Work—Rev.
Dr. Perry Elected President.

At the annual meeting yesterday of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance the following officers were elected: President, Rev. H. Francis Perry, D.D.; vice-presidents, J. K. Macdonald, Rev. A. Carman, D.D., L.L.D., Right Rev. V. L. Mills, D.D., L.L.D., Rev. S. D. Chown, D.D., Rev. L. Norman Tucker, D.C.L., Chancellor A. C. McKay, L.L.D., Mrs. Gordon Wright, secretary, Rev. W. G. Hanna, B.A., assistant secretary, Rev. T. Albert Moore, treasurer, Chas. T. Copp, M.D.

The standing committee were also elected. The chairmen are: Legal, John A. Paterson, K.C.; legislation, J. K. Macdonald; organization, Rev. D. W. Snider; finance, John E. Brown. The secretary reported satisfactory progress. Much educational work had been done, and the people of the province had been gaining better information regarding the value of the

Lord's Day as a national asset, its necessity to their well-being, and the urgent need for its preservation.

"They are getting a better understanding of the equitable and reasonable character of the Lord's Day laws and in consequence there is a deepening sense of respect for these laws, and, with that, increased realization of their responsibility to obey them," said the report.

"The method of enforcing law by remonstrance and persuasion as far as possible without litigation has won the approval of not a few who formerly did not regard the work with favor."

While several hundred complaints had been received only about two per cent. of the cases complained of had been brought to court, and in each case only after two fair opportunities had been given to cease from violating the law.

Last year over 25 per cent. of the cheese factories of the province did Sunday work. During this year less than 5 per cent. persisted in doing so. The running of trains and electric cars on Sunday not only added a day of profit to the railway companies, but also by depriving employees of needed rest and impairing their efficiency had greatly increased the danger. The railway commission, it was felt, should take this matter up.

Resolutions were passed recommending district conferences during the year at various centres; an endeavor to attract a larger attendance at the annual meetings in future; that leaflets concerning Sunday observance be printed in various languages for circulation among immigrants.

Whiskey Cases.

WHITBY, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—R. W. Toms of Liverpool, near Dunbarton, was yesterday fined \$30 and costs for having on his hotel premises a case of intoxicating liquors. Jas. Gordon of Pickering was charged with keeping whiskey for sale or treats in his hotel in Pickering. The defense admitted the presence of a bottle of whiskey on the premises on Nov. 7, but convinced the court that it was kept for medicinal purposes.

A large Sullivan compressor plant has been purchased and is being installed as rapidly as possible. The company from the sale of treasury stock have ample funds to fully equip the mine and develop it.

The rock formation of this property is mostly diabase and is the same flow in which occurs the No. 3 Kerr Lake vein, which vein has been proven to a depth of over 400 feet in very rich ore; the No. 5, which is probably the biggest vein in the Cobalt District, having been traced for over 1700 feet on the surface and is from 6 to 24 inches in width, composed of calcite, smallite and galena, with small silver values on the surface as well as ore, the 150 foot shaft, and the No. 9, which contained rich silver ore in the shaft and below the 70 foot level.

Because of the above facts, that two of the veins show good silver values and the third, which is unusually large for the Cobalt District, could be worked to a depth of 5000 feet, with additional possibilities of striking bonanza streak, and also because the property is so well situated with regard to other very rich producing properties, I have no hesitation in stating that I consider the Badger one of the most attractive properties in the Cobalt District.

BADGER MINE LOCATED IN THE HEART OF CAMP

Celebrated Engineers Speak Most Favorably of the Possibilities of the Property.

The Badger Mines Company, Limited, owns in fee simple 80 acres of land known as the south quarter of lot 2, in the fourth concession of the Township of Coleman, District of Nipissing.

Preliminary prospecting was done by trenching to bed rock in the search for veins carrying silver values. About half of the Badger acreage has been so prospected with the net result of locating nine veins.

Vein No. 1 was the original discovery on the Badger and consists of a vein of native silver from 1 to 6 inches in width. A vertical shaft has been sunk on this vein for 60 feet and about 100 feet of cross-cutting has been done to prove the presence of this vein and to locate and in the immediate neighborhood at this level.

Vein No. 2 crosses No. 1 vein about 25 feet east from shaft 1 and while not developed has given assays as high as 3000 ounces of silver to the ton. It has been traced to the southwest as far as the Badger's south line and from there it has been traced by the Rochester and it appears to be the same vein that is being worked by them. For the 200 feet that it lies on the Badger property it ranges from 1 to 8 inches in thickness.

Vein No. 3 is in the northwest corner of lot 2, about 200 feet of it lying on the Badger property.

Vein No. 4 is centrally located in lot 3 and as far as traced is much the same as vein 2.

Vein No. 5—This is undoubtedly the most extraordinary vein in the entire Cobalt District. It strikes across a bend of one of the water courses, over high ground, northeast and southwest, and has been traced on the surface for about 1700 feet, showing a vein of remarkable consistency, of a thickness of from 14 to 24 inches of calcite, freely mineralized. The full extent of this vein has not been determined, as at this point it is running into the water course forbids surface exploration. Three prospecting shafts have been sunk on this vein, numbered respectively, 3, 4 and 5, which demonstrate highly mineralized ore. This vein, for its entire length, in all the shafts sunk and in the 160 foot drift shows a remarkable resemblance to the famous Crown Reserve vein, which carried no values on the surface, but with depth developed into a vein ranging from 14 to 24 inches in thickness. In silver that it is considered the wonder of the entire camp.

Vein No. 6 strikes west, southwest and east, northeast, and has never been explored further than to determine that it is a calcite vein with cobalt ores and small silver values.

Vein No. 7, in the extreme southeast corner of the property, is of the same character and due to the same facts, in the same condition as vein 6.

Vein No. 8 of the same general character as veins 6 and 7, is located on a high outcrop of rock, where the prospects are deep sinking will be necessary to reach shipping values.

At this point on the vein where no native silver values showed on the surface, but where there was a two inch deposit of cobalt ore, a shaft was sunk to a depth of 224 feet, which is 70 degrees to the north. No bonanza values were encountered on this vein until 120 feet were reached. From that point to a depth of 165 feet rich shipping ore is constantly present in the shaft. It is from this vein that most of the ore the company's ore house has been obtained.

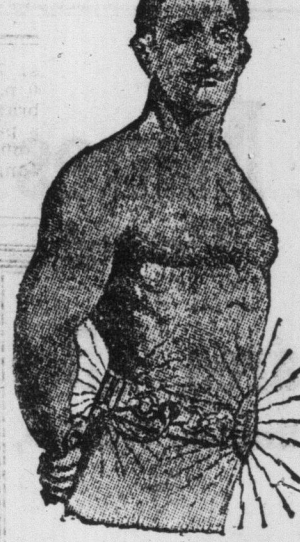

MARKET LETTER.

Toronto, Nov. 14th, 1908.

While we are at all times closely in touch with Cobalt conditions, it has been some months since our Mr. Lockwood has visited the camp personally.

He found, upon his recent trip to Cobalt with the brokers of the Standard Exchange, that the extensive development work done in these months far exceeded his most sanguine expectations. Consequently, his previous firm faith in the future of Cobalt has become, if possible, intensified.

THE MOTHER LODGE MINE.

One of the Very Rich Mines of the Montreal River District—Some Fine Ore Samples.

Mr. E. O. Knight, secretary of the Mother Lodge Mining Co. of the Montreal River district, was in the city yesterday. He was very enthusiastic regarding the prospects of the new camp. On his own property the Mother Lodge Mine, 250 feet of underground work, such as tunneling, underdrifting and sinking, has already been completed. Considerable ore has been blocked ready for stopping. Stopping will begin at the 90 foot and 140 foot level.

Mr. Knight predicts that the Mother Lodge will be the first shipper out of the district, as it has reached the highest state of development of any mine in the district.

A complete set of camps sufficient to accommodate sixty people is already on the ground, and all arrangements have been completed for an active winter campaign. Mr. Knight brought to Toronto with him 500 lbs. of ore from the Mother Lodge, among which were some very fine samples.

Larder Lake News.—Both the Harris-Maxwell and the Reddick are working full time, each having two shifts. It is reported that the Reddick will add thirty more stamps, which will make a total of fifty stamps. The Tournelle Indian Company have a force of men permanently employed on their properties in sinking shafts and blocking out their ore bodies. They already have two shafts below the 50-foot level, and on reaching the 100-foot depth it is the intention to cross-cut their gold-bearing dyke. The Lucky Boys property will soon be equipped with a twenty-stamp mill. Several mining properties have changed hands within the past week, and many deals for valuable properties are now pending.

The Golden Eagle, a property owned by Mayor Lang of Cobalt, has been in several New York parties, has just opened up some very rich ore, samples lately taken from this property assaying several hundred ounces of silver, and also showing some free gold.

Mrs. Howard W. Caster of Haileybury, the owner of some choice property near Binney Lake, has been in the district several days, and is much pleased with the progress made in the development of her property, which is under option of \$100,000. The block consists of four forty-acre claims, each having free gold showings. Mrs. Caster states that the 40-foot shaft will be continued to a depth of 100 feet, when a cross-cut will be run south 100 feet, completely cutting a gold-bearing dyke, which is fully 100 feet in width. Everything is being put in shape for the territory for a twenty-stamp mill, which will be erected during the winter.
