### ANNUAL REPORT OF McGILL UNIVERSITY.

Year 1904-05 Was One of Most Successful in History of the Institution===The Deficit is But \$500 === Sir William Macdonald's Benefaction for Student Union Biggest Item of the Year.

The annual report of the govermors, principal, and fellows of McGill University for the year 19081904, which is the seventy-fifth year
of the teaching work of the university, has just been published, and
shows that the past year was marked by advances in every way. The
student attendance in most of the
faculties was greater than any previous year in the history of the university, while the record of original research and investigation undertaken,
as well as the output of published
work, continued to add to the reputation and prestige of the professorial body. Even in the department
of finance there was ground for encouragement and satisfaction. In an
Institution with constantly increasing needs as must necessarily characterize the work of a modern and
progressive university it speaks well

The most important thing in the history of the session had been the gift to the university by Sir William Macdonald, chairman of the board of governors, of the sum of \$105.
