OLD GOVERNMENT HOUSE FOR THE USE OF RETURNED SOLDIERS

Fredericton, Oct. 16.—The Old Government House here, which for many years was headquarters of Lieutenant-Governors of New Brunswick, is to become the New Brunswick convalescent home for returned soldiers.

Word reached here today that a conference was held at Ottawa on Saturday at which Lieut.-Colonel P. A. Guthrie discussed the matter fully with Sir James Loughhead, chairman of the military hospitals commission. Brigadier-General MacLean was present and was also Prof. T. B. Kidder, secretary of technical education division of the commission, who recently made an inspection of the old Government House property.

Definite arrangements were made that if the old Government House is fixed up for the 25th overseas battalion, it shall be taken over as soon as the 10th leave and will be a home for New Brunswick's returned soldiers. The Parks Convalescent Home at St. John will be used for special cases, of which there will be sufficient to take up all available accommodations.

The plan is to make the old Government House a modern technical school where returned soldiers, while being cared for, will be given instruction in agriculture, mechanics and all useful training to fit them for work which they will take up after the war.

There will be a full staff of teachers and the property adjoining the buildings will be used for agricultural educational work, so that there will be practical demonstrations right on the grounds.

NEW YORK GREEKS FOR WAR AT ONCE ON SIDE OF ALLIES

New York, Oct. 16.—With tumultuous enthusiasm and prolonged cheering followed by the singing of the national anthem, the Venizelos party in America was formed yesterday afternoon at a meeting of more than 6,000 Greeks in the hall of the Pan-Hellenic Union, West Thirtieth street. Greeks from all over the city and nearby cities attended the meeting. It was estimated that more than 10,000 flocked to the hall and those who could not get in held overflowed meetings on the sidewalk. All were in favour of the old government of Greece had tried to betray their country and that the government of Venizelos, which is a provisional government, was destined to be its saviour. For funds for the assistance of Venizelos more than \$4,000 was subscribed in less than ten minutes. A little bootblack gave \$10.

RESOLUTIONS were unanimously adopted insisting on the immediate entry of Greece into the war on the side of the allies.

What Can Be Accomplished When Necessary Legislation is Provided

(Conservation.)

The extent to which preventive measures can be made effective in forest fire protection is indicated by the experience this season of the St. Maurice Forest Protective Association. This is an association of land-holders, representing some 12,000 square miles of forest land on the St. Maurice river watershed. In previous years, much loss has resulted from fires due to the carelessness of settlers in clearing lands of river-drivers and others who had occasion to build camp fires in the woods. A vigorous campaign of education has almost eliminated these sources of fire damage within association territory. This result could not, however, have been accomplished in the case of settlers' area, without a strict enforcement of the law which prohibits settlers from setting out clearing fires during the summer season, except on permit issued by a forest ranger. The enforcement of this provision, in combination with the vigorous campaign of education, has been so effective that the manager of the association, Henry Songas, reports that, this season, only one fire within association territory has been set by human agency, all the other fires reported having been caused by lightning. There has been no trouble with settlers, and it is reported that they are very generally in favor of the permit system.

In view of this admirable record in an important section of Quebec, it is evident that the province of Ontario should consider very seriously the adoption of the permit system. If a repetition of the day but disaster of 1915 is to be avoided, and if prospective settlers are to be assured that life and property will be sufficiently safeguarded to justify them in making their homes in the north country.—C. L.
