Another brother of Thomas L. Wilson of North End has crossed the Atlantic in the army of the King, Frank Wilson, formerly of this city, late of Winnipeg, being now in England with the 46th Battalion, known as the Cameron Highlanders. The news of their successful landing came this week in press cables. Frank Wilson is a sergeant in his company, his previous military knowledge and experience gained in fighting the Boer War in France had stood him in good stead.

MRS. ROBT. THOMSON'S WILL IS PROBATED

Estate of \$35,000 Mostly to Son and Two Daughters

Some Bequests to Other Relatives—James Nixon's Estate \$4,600—Terms of His Will

In the probate court today, the will of Mrs. Louise Anne Thomson, widow of Robert Thomson, was proved. She gives her niece, Marion Rankin, \$200; to Jean Donald, widow of George W. Donald, \$500; to May Donald, widow of J. Walker Donald, \$500; to her half sister, Linda Agnes Donald, \$300; to Marion S. Crookshank, widow of Allan O. Crookshank, \$200; to Sophie Moorman, wife of James Moorman, \$200; to Freda Donald, daughter of Louis Donald, \$50; to the following persons if they were still in her employ at the time of her death—Matilda Logue, \$150; Janet Kirkland, \$75; Annie Robertson, \$50; also to Maud Sherwood Thomson, wife of Percy Walter Thomson, and to the deceased's grandson, Eric Donald Thomson, the proceeds of insurance on the life of her late husband. She gives her \$10,000 to her daughter Mabel Gordon Thomson, the rest of her estate goes to her son Percy W. Thomson and her two daughters share and share alike, and nominates as executor Percy Moorman. He was accordingly sworn in as such. Real estate consists of the family residence on the corner of Middlebury and Sydney streets valued at \$18,000; personally \$20,000; total estate \$38,000. Messrs Rankin & Logan are executors.

The will of James Nixon, trader, was proved. He directs his executors and trustees to divide all his estate amongst his four children, John Nixon, at present on home service with the Army Service Corps, aged nineteen, and two daughters, Alma and Dorothy, both under age. He nominates Kenneth J. MacRae, barrister-at-law, and Charles E. Swanton, stevedore, executors, and they were sworn in as such. Real estate consists of two lots of land on the Black River Road, Simonds, valued at \$200; life insurance \$1,000 in the I. O. F.; two leaseholds in Brussels street valued at \$1,700. Cash and personal effects \$1,700; total estate \$4,600. John A. Sinclair is executor.
