Joseph P. Coughlin Again
Chosen President of
Y. M. C. I.

New Board of Management
Elected—Good Report on
Start of Season.

Joseph P. Coughlin will direct the work of the Young Men's Catholic Institute this year. He was unanimously re-elected president at the annual election of officers conducted last evening. Mr. Coughlin, thus is the president for a third term. He is keenly interested in the progress of the institute and has given much time and thought to its advancement. Mr. Sullivan found that he could not give the time to the office this year. He presented a statement last evening showing that September had given the institute a much better start than was the case at the beginning of the 1924 fall activities.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 11—A rum running motor boat, seized on the Saint John River at Hampstead by prohibition inspectors and inland revenue officials, has been brought here and turned over to Collector of Customs MacNutt. John Neilson, of Hampstead, owner of the boat, paid a fine of \$200 for violation of the prohibition act. A small quantity of smuggled liquor and some alcohol was found in the boat, which appears to have been running liquor from Saint John to points along the river and Grand Lake. The seized boat is said to be worth between \$1,000 and \$1,200.

Days.

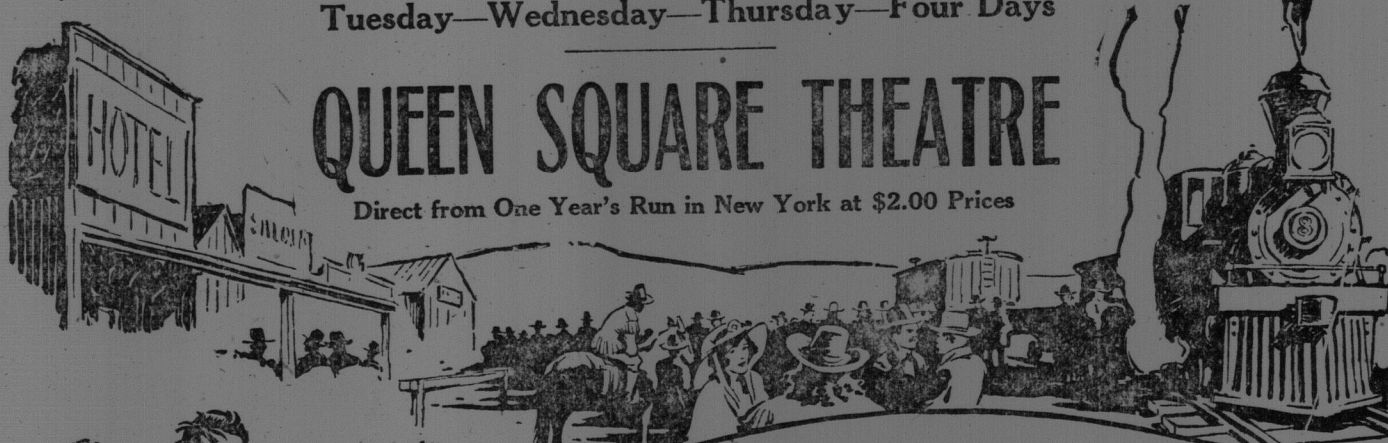

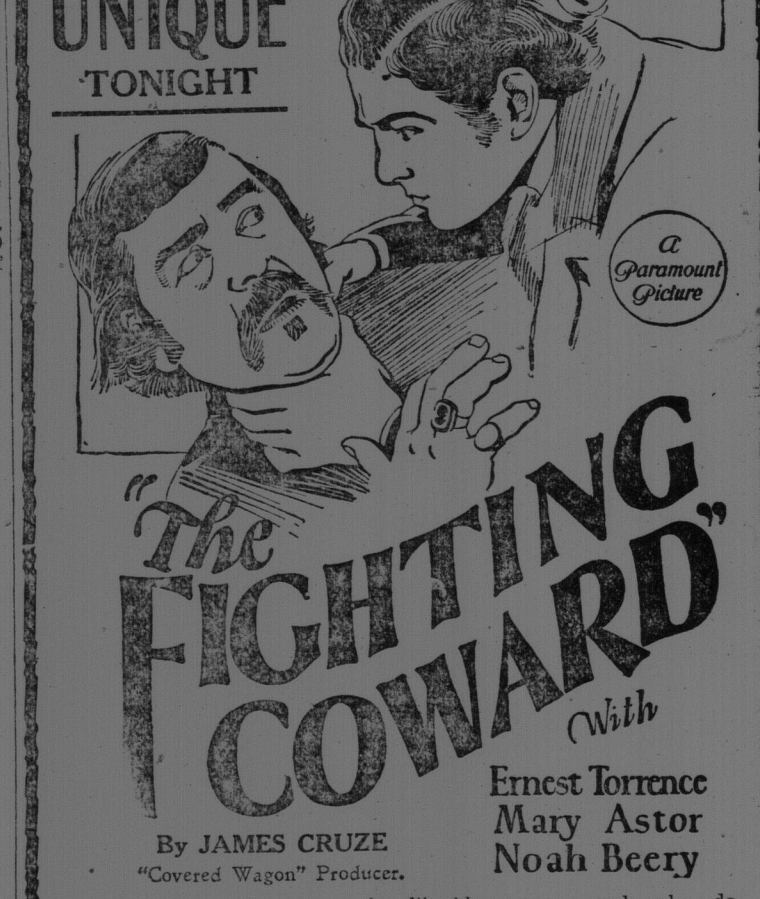


Who's Who in World Series

GRANTHAM—PIRATES.
George Farkley Grantham, first baseman, is one of the players obtained from Chicago last winter in a deal which brought along Vic Aldridge and Bert Nicholas for Rabbit Maraville, Charley Grimm and Wilbur Cooper.
In Chicago he was a second baseman, but McKeehole transformed him into a first sacker when Nicholas proved a "bust." In 100 games he has batted .320, and is considered one of the most dangerous hitters in the Pirate cast.
Grantham played with the Cubs three years and in 1921 batted .316.

ALDRIDGE—PIRATES.
Vic Aldridge, a big right-hander, has been a successful pitcher throughout his major league career. In three years with the Chicago Cubs he won 47 games and lost 26. He had a trial in 1917 and 1918 with the same club, winning six and losing six.
His earlier experience was with Tacoma in 1920-1921 and Omaha of the Western League in 1922.
He is a native of Galena, Kas., and is 25 years old. He is 5 feet, 10 inches tall, weighs 155, and is one of the fastest men in the game.
