SERVICE TO BE AS LAST SEASON

C. G. M. M. Announcement of Saint John Sailings Is Made

First Vessel, Canadian Mariner, Now on Way Here From Swansea

Fortnightly Canadian Government Merchant Marine sailings, similar to last season, will be maintained from this port on the Cardiff and Swansea and the London and Antwerp services according to an announcement received by The Times-Star from Montreal.
