Grand Rapids, Mich., March 18.—Bob A. knocked out Tommy McCarthy in the third round of a scheduled round contest here last night.

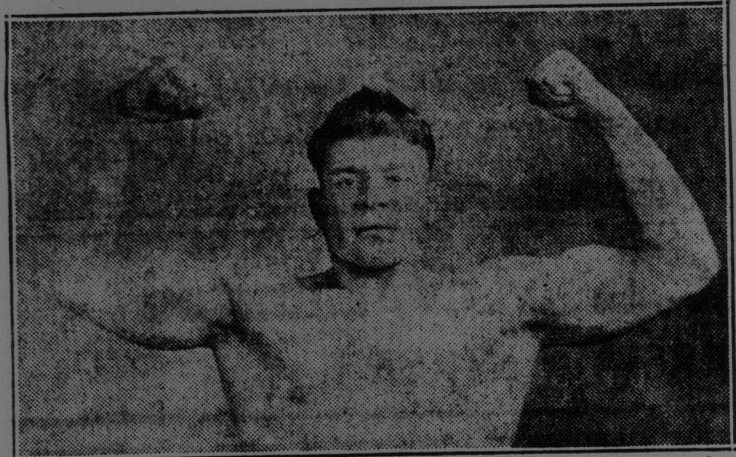
CANADIAN WINS
