

POLICE COURT
Edward O'Brien was in the court this morning charged with using profane and obscene language. Detective Saunders gave evidence. The man was fined \$8 on each charge and two months in jail with hard labor on each. Five men were charged with drunkenness. They pleaded guilty and were fined \$8 each or two months in jail.

CLEVER BOY VIOLINIST
The violin solo at the Art Club last evening was by Francis Barry (not Perry). He is very clever boy. This was his first appearance before a large audience, and he was warmly applauded. Mrs. M. C. Good, his accompanist also rendered a vocal obligato and accompaniment.

HOME FROM OVERSEAS
Rev. H. L. Eisenor of St. Matthew's church, North End, yesterday received a telegram stating that his brother, Harris, had arrived from overseas. He enlisted in the 21st Nova Scotia Highland Battalion, in the spring of 1916. In England he was transferred to the 8th Canadian Machine Gun Battalion, and served in France with that unit. Mr. Eisenor went through severe fighting but always escaped without a scratch. He was in the army of occupation in Germany near Cologne.

SILENT POLICEMEN
Commissioner Thornton is securing information regarding the various types of so called "silent policemen," stands which are used at street intersections to act as guides to traffic. There are several corners in the city, that at Main and Adelaide for instance, where the traffic is not sufficient to require the continued presence of a traffic policeman of the human variety, but where something seems to be required to keep the vehicles to their proper sides of the street.

The president of the Navy League last evening received a wire stating that Peter Wright, councillor of the British Seamen's Union, will be here next week and will be accompanied by Lieut. Jackson, R. N., the dominion secretary of the Navy League. Mr. Wright is in Canada under the auspices of the Navy League and has already addressed crowded houses all over Canada at his home, the British sailors have done during the war and why they have resolved not to sail in any ship with even one German sailor or for fifteen years. He is a most telling speaker and will no doubt address a meeting here.

FORMER ST. JOHN LADY DIES IN AUSTRALIA
Mrs. Maurice Breen of 86 Castle street, received word late last night that her sister, Mrs. Lillian Ashton, had died in Australia. She was a daughter of the late Charles and Catherine Hakan of this city. Besides her sister, Mrs. Breen she leaves her husband, P. J. Ashton of Australia. It is thought that her body will be brought to this city for burial. Mrs. Ashton left here more than twenty years ago. She was forty-one years of age. Many friends in this city will be sorry to learn of her death.

His death will be regretted by many. The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon from his late residence.

A LOVING CUP AND FLOWERS

Women of St. John Pay Graceful Tribute to the Men of the First Contingent

The women's tribute was one of the finest features of last night's banquet at the Armories. There has since been difficulty in reaching through any single channel the men who left here in 1914 and were later scattered into many units. Last night, however, the ladies of the city took advantage of the first reunion of men of the First Contingent to express something of the deep feeling of respect and pride which lies deep in the hearts of the citizens for the men who sprang forward at the first call of the empire at the outbreak of the war and achieved such splendid results in the field in face of the terrible hardship and unpreparedness.

When the guests were all assembled at the Armories last night and dinner was about to be served, a communication was sent in through the committee of management and immediately Gen. Macdonell and his party rose to their feet. A deputation of ladies entered the banquet hall, representing the Women's Canadian Club, Daughters of the Empire and Young Women's Patriotic Association, supported by Mrs. R. T. Hayes, wife of the mayor.

Miss Nan Brock carried a fine silver loving cup and as the party reached the table where the chief guests were seated she addressed Gen. Macdonell, saying that the ladies with her had come to make a little presentation to the veterans.

Lady Tilley, receiving the cup from Miss Brock, presented it to the general, saying she had been asked to do so on behalf of the women of St. John. In the words inscribed on the cup she said: "This is a tribute to the fine spirit of our officers and men who went out to active service in the great war with the First Canadian Contingent, from the women of St. John."
