In the commons at Ottawa on Saturday a resolution was introduced providing for an increase in salaries of judges to \$5,000 per annum for chief justices and \$7,000 per annum for assistant judges. These salaries were not to apply to Quebec and P. E. I. and objection was made by these provinces' members protesting that salaries there should be no lower than elsewhere. Final action was not taken on the motion.

At a Liberal convention in Fredericton on Saturday P. J. Hughes, R. B. Smith, M. P. P., and C. N. Woodspeed, were elected delegates to the dominion convention at Ottawa in August.

The British ship R 84 is expected at Long Island, N. Y., on July 5 or 6. F. J. Dixon, A. A. for Central Winnipeg, was arrested there yesterday charged with sedition. He is said to have been written for in the Western Labor News. The steamer Metagama sailed yesterday for Quebec with a large body of soldiers and dependents.

The Chinese delegates refused to sign the peace treaty at Versailles on Saturday.

Miss Elizabeth Johnston.

Miss Elizabeth Johnston died yesterday afternoon at her late residence, 74 Dorchester street. Miss Johnston was eighty-two years old, was born in St. John and lived here practically all her life. She leaves to mourn one sister, Mrs. Isabelle Fuller, also of this city. The funeral is to take place at 2 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon from her late residence.

Mrs. Lena Wilson, wife of Charles Wilson and daughter of Robert Earle, died yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock at her father's residence, Pleasant Point. She was only twenty-three years old and leaves to mourn besides her husband, her father, one daughter, a brother, her step-mother, three step-sisters and four step-brothers. The funeral is to take place at 2:30 (old time) on Tuesday from her father's residence, and the funeral service will be conducted in St. Jude's church.

The death of William H. MacLaren occurred yesterday at his home, 114 Prince street, West St. John. Mr. MacLaren was sixty-six years of age and had been ill only about two months. Many St. John people will remember the famous "MacLaren four" which in the "seventies" made a memorable name for itself in the trials for the Paris races. William MacLaren who rowed low, was the last surviving member of the crew. He leaves his wife, two daughters, Miss Sadie and Mrs. George Vaughan, both of this city, and one son, W. Rex, of Grand Falls.

The many friends of Mrs. Hannah Pitt will regret to learn of her death which occurred on June 28 at her residence in Cambridge (Mass.). She was the widow of Joseph Pitt, a former resident of this city, and was ninety-nine years and three months of age. She is survived by four sons—Dr. Charles P. Pitt, and James S. Pitt, both of Cambridge; Dr. T. F. Pitt, of Wells (Mass.); and Henry M. Pitt, of this city; by one daughter—Miss Maud Pitt, of Cambridge; by two grandsons, Harry V. Pitt and Charles D. Pitt, of this city, and by one grand daughter, Mrs. Boyer, of Woodstock.

The funeral will be tomorrow from the C. R. station on the arrival of the Boston train at noon. Interment will take place in the Church of England burying ground.

Mrs. Aben Spencer, wife of a C. G. R. operator at Hartibog, died in the Moncton city hospital. She was twenty-two years of age and daughter of Matthew Little of Coal Branch.

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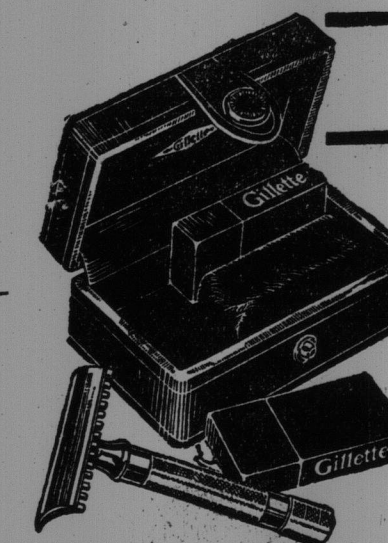

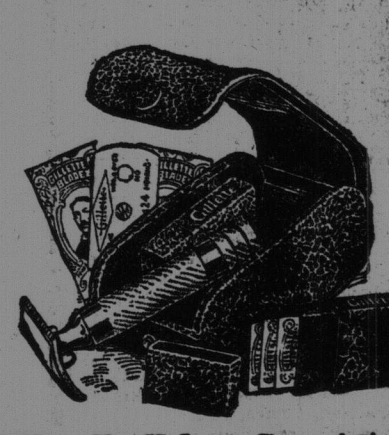
