GOLDWIN SMITH ESTATE

(Toronto Mail and Empire). A payment of \$20,000 on account was received by the provincial government on Saturday as a portion of the succession duties which will be paid on the estate of the late Goldwin Smith. There will be \$30,000 or \$40,000 additional when the estate is finally wound up. Succession duties for April amounted to \$135,577, as compared with \$88,218 in April last year. Since November 1, the commencement of the fiscal year, the province has received \$388,320 in succession duties.
