ACCORDING to late reports from New York betting was even on the two world's champions, Willie Hoppe and Bob Cannefax, who were scheduled to get away this afternoon in their three-cushion billiard series. BRITISH turfmen are apparently apprehensive concerning an invasion of United States and French crack runners in the coming season, which is scheduled to open at Lincoln about the end of March. Judging from reports published about the English turf, racing there is as vigorous as ever it has been. The records show that 4,536 horses participated in different meets last season and that their owners netted over \$3,500,000 in purses. French owners, who had a number of victories last year, have entered several horses for the Lincoln handicap and the big races at Ascot. They have 12 of their best runners in the Ascot Gold Cup, which is booked for June 18. Judging from articles appearing in some of the English sport sheets an American invasion is more greatly feared than the French. Already many horses from the States have been entered for the big turf classics this season, A. K. Macomber, who took over the late W. K. Vanderbilt's establishment in France, is said to be the chief menace. He has entered 11 colts in this yerr's Derby, eight in the St. Leger and nine fillies in the Oaks. From this it will be seen that there may be good reason to fear exceptionally


