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CHINA DECLARES WAR

A Sensational Story From St. Petersburg, Russia.

A VICTORY FOR THE ALLIES.

Second Attack on Tien Tsin Was a Success—Several Strong Chinese Positions Taken—Reports From U. S. Admiral—Loss of the Allies in Tien Tsin Fight Was Heavy.

London, July 15.—(4 a.m.)—The news of the Manchurian disturbances is not regarded as justifying the serious view attributed by the Daily Mail's advisers. Anwar, the boundary territory, between Eastern Manchuria and Manchuria, has been the scene of local disturbances for a long time, owing to the provocative conduct of the Chinese towards the 25,000 Chinese employed in the construction of the Russo-Manchurian Railway.

Several serious collisions have occurred between the Cossacks and the Chinese troops. One happened several weeks ago, when two Russian officers and 10 men were killed. The extension of the Russo-Manchurian Railway has resulted in the destruction of the railway, compelling the Russians to withdraw their officials.

The Chinese tried to stop the Russian steamer carrying ammunition and the steamer Selenia, with the Russian troops, from passing up the Amur at Aikun. They fired on the steamer, wounding an officer and a few sailors, but the steamer escaped. The Chinese local Chinese commander at Aikun seems to have sent the Russians a note of ultimatum.

According to a despatch from Shanghai dated July 14, dated yesterday, a massacre occurred on July 9, at Tientsin, capital of the Province of Shansi, 40 Chinese and 100 native converts being killed.

China Has Declared War.

The Daily Mail publishes a sensational despatch from St. Petersburg, dated Monday, which asserts that there is no doubt that China has declared war against Russia.

ONE PORT UNCAPTURED.

The Story at the German Foreign Office Does Not Say All the Facts.

Berlin, July 17.—An official of the Foreign Office here today told the Daily Mail's news from the fight at Tien Tsin on July 15 was more favorable than the one published in the Daily Mail. Admiral Seymour has reported that the attack on the Chinese was successful, but not wholly so, one fort remaining uncaptured.

DOMINION ALLIANCE.

Ontario Branch Lays Down a Scheme of Action for Prohibition by Provinces.

Toronto, July 18.—The Ontario Council of the Dominion Alliance, a number of resolutions, and the resolutions passed yesterday may be summarized.

The Dominion Government was secured to secure the prohibition laws and prohibitionists were urged to oppose the government that failed to enforce the prohibition laws.

The Ontario Executive was instructed to organize to secure the defeat of all members of Parliament who have ignored the mandate of the people.

The Ontario Government will be waited upon early next session, with the demand that legislation be passed prohibiting the sale of liquor in Ontario as far as possible and should the Opposition be returned to power the same demand will be made upon them.

The sale of alcoholic beverages in military cantons was roundly denounced by the Ontario Council.

The principle of woman suffrage was again commended.

The Finance Committee reported \$127 on hand. The officers of the current year were all re-elected, and are:

A public meeting was held in the pavilion last night, when strong speeches were made.

Old Man Shot Two Boys.

Thamesville, Ont., July 18.—Yesterday afternoon the two sons of Dr. Duncan of Chatham, who are on a visit here, were shot by Samuel Goddard, an old pensioner, and severely wounded. The older son was shot in the back and legs, while the younger received wounds in the knee and foot. The shooting is said to have been without provocation. Chief Twigg promptly arrested Goddard and placed him behind the bars, where he awaits his hearing this morning.

The Shah at St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, July 18.—Nast-Eddir, Shah of Persia, arrived in St. Petersburg yesterday. He was welcomed at the railway station by Emperor Nicholas and other members of the Imperial family, who greeted him cordially.

Nasty Take-From the Bay.

Toronto, July 18.—The body of Rupert L. Lovell, who disappeared on the ship "Sardinia" last week, was picked up yesterday at a point about 50 yards from where the empty boat was picked up.

Eight Chinese Guns Captured.

Tien Tsin, Friday, July 13.—In today's combined attack upon the native city over 40 guns bombarded the Chinese position. The fighting was most determined, and the allies' losses were heavy. Eight Chinese guns were captured and the Chinese were driven out of the west arsenal after a fierce cannonade.

A strong mixed force is now close to the walls, and it is expected that an assault will be made to-morrow.

ADmiral RENEW'S MESSAGE.

Says the Force of Tien Tsin Are in Hands of the Allies.

Washington, July 15.—Admiral Henry T. Tilden today advised the Navy Department that the city and forts of Tien Tsin are in the hands of the allies. His list of killed and wounded is somewhat different from yesterday's report, but still not in favor of the Chinese.

General Renew cabled the Navy Department.

"The Force of Tien Tsin today got wounded from Tien Tsin, other in hospitals at Taku or aboard Solace. Communication very uncertain."

"Following casualties apparently confirmed:

"Victims—Captain Davis, killed; Captain Lewis, Lieutenant Butler and Leonard wounded."

"Armed—Col. Latham, killed; Major Reagan and Lee, Captains Noyes, Brewster and Bookholder, Lieutenants Naylor, Lawton, Hammond and Walcott wounded."

"Total killed and wounded reported, 775; Russian and Japanese loss heavy. Our total reported killed and wounded, 100."

"Have officer on shore authority to get authentic number and names, which will be promptly telegraphed. City and forts now in the hands of the allies."

Admiral Seymour returned to fleet ranking officer at Tien Tsin, where he is at present.

This bulletin was received at the Navy Department early this morning, and was signed by Admiral Seymour, dated Monday.

Before it was given out it was decided to make some change in the copy, the nature of which was not disclosed, and the above copy was finally given to the public.
