SENATOR DRUMMOND

Wants 22-Knot Steamers Between Great Britain and Halifax.

LONDON, July 22.—The House of Commons committee appointed to inquire into the question of steamship subsidies was in session today and examined Senator G. A. Drummond, of Montreal. Mr. Drummond said that he had arrived at the conclusion, from recent developments of American shipping companies, that the land line practically controlled the situation and that the ocean lines were merely adjuncts.
