DR. HANNAH'S OPINION.

Dr. Ian C. Hannah, ex-president of  
Kings College, has during a course of  
lectures, at Cambridge, been telling the  
students that within a generation  
eastern Canada will be French again,  
with English communities only in the  
towns. He describes as a paradox of  
history that the French race, conquered  
in Canada, by remaining in the country,  
by raising large families and by ex-  
tending their frontiers beyond the pre-  
sented, will make their influence again predominant.

If the value of this opinion is to be  
measured by Dr. Hannah's length of  
residence in Canada and by the oppor-  
tunities afforded him for studying  
conditions here, those of us who do not  
happen to be of French descent need  
feel but little alarm at the peril which  
the future has in store. It is true that  
the descendants of the French settlers  
are increasing in numbers, but Dr.  
Hannah forgets that these are not  
French people but French-Canadians,  
with the accent on the second word,  
and that this makes a very great dif-  
ference. He also fails to recognize the  
fact that the influence of the British  
born inhabitants on those of French  
descent is strong, that more French-  
speaking people are learning English  
than there are English learning French,  
and most important of all Dr. Hannah  
fails to grasp the idea that the in-  
habitants of this land take a pride in  
their Canadian citizenship, and not in  
the fact that they are English, or French,  
or Dutch descent. It is true that Que-  
bec's population is rapidly increasing,  
true that the other eastern provinces  
are almost at a standstill, but this will  
make no difference in thirty years  
when, instead of being English or  
French, the people of this part of the  
Dominion will have altogether forgotten  
their fast fading racial distinctions and  
will be purely Canadians.

AFRAID OF EMPEROR WILLIAM

Great Britain Doomed Unless She Adopts  
Chamberlainism.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Col. John Lam-  
bert, a Chicago capitalist, who has just  
returned to London from a tour of the  
continent, in an interview published in  
the Daily Mail this morning, expresses  
the belief that unless Great Britain  
adopts Chamberlainism, she must go  
down in business. Col. Lambert said  
that both France and Germany are more  
prosperous than Great Britain, and  
especially Germany, owing to Empe-  
ror William's surpassing gifts as a ruler.  
The emperor, he said, had put Ger-  
many in the way of becoming the rich-  
est nation in Europe, had perfected the  
finest army on the continent, and was  
laying the foundation of one of the  
greatest fleets afloat. His consular ser-  
vice, Col. Lambert said, was an un-  
matched triumph, and behind it, sub-  
sidized railways and steamships,  
methodically fostered trusts, and a  
tariff like a Chinese wall. "If we are  
not careful," Colonel Lambert added,  
"we will lick us out of our boots all  
over the world."

LOCAL GOVERNMENT GETS  
MUCH BUSINESS DONE

All Day Session Held Yesterday—Dr. Harrison's Resig-  
nation Received and a Committee Appointed to Act  
With University Senate—Other Matters of Import-  
ance Dealt With.

FREDERICTON, Aug. 31.—The local  
government was in session all day and  
executed a large amount of business.

The request of the C. P. R. to build  
sea walls at St. Andrews and St. John  
was referred to the provincial engineer  
to report on. The question of the gov-  
ernment purchasing 50,000 acres in  
Victoria county for settlement pur-  
poses from the New Brunswick Land  
Company was discussed, and it was  
decided to await full reports of sur-  
veys before taking any action in the  
matter.

The resignation of Chancellor Harri-  
son was accepted, and the premier  
center county were selling by retail,  
with the chief commissioner were ap-  
pointed a committee to act with the  
university senate as to selecting a  
chancellor after the senate had filled  
the vacant professorship.

Chairman McMillan of local Board  
of Health, was ordered to be paid the  
sum of \$150 on account of smallpox in  
York by the receiver general. This  
amount is to be deducted from any  
payment the government may have to  
make in the future to the county of  
York for smallpox. This payment was  
ordered on Chairman McMillan's re-  
quest, as he alleged he had not suffi-  
cient funds to meet the expenditures

and that he had already expended \$50  
out of his own pocket.

The petition of the barristers of  
Fredericton for the abolition of the  
small debt court, was considered. The  
government practically agreed to the  
request of the petitioners, and Colonel  
Marsh was appointed to wind up the  
outstanding business of the late  
Judge Peters, and the government at  
the next session of the legislature will  
introduce an act abolishing  
the small debt court. The  
petitioner general who acted  
as commissioner into the charge that  
the wholesale liquor vendors of Glou-  
cester county were selling by retail,  
reported that the charges were for the  
most part supported, and the govern-  
ment has ordered that the chairman  
and inspector in that county be re-  
appointed. The attorney general will  
be absent for three or four weeks from  
his duties, beginning with September  
4th, and the premier will act as at-  
torney general in his absence. The  
board of education met this afternoon,  
but no business of any importance was  
transacted. The governor will go to  
St. John in the morning. The govern-  
ment decided to sell 32 lots adjoining  
the provincial hospital during the  
month of September.

"BECAUSE IT IS IN CANADA."

Mr. Latchford Thinks There Should be  
More Said About Cobalt.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 31.—"It's like a  
fairly tale, but no fairy tale can equal  
it," is F. R. Latchford's comment upon  
the recent silver discovery in Cobalt,  
whence he has just returned. "If," he  
continued, "the discovery was made on  
the South Sea or in Timbuctoo, the  
world would ring with it, but because  
it happens to be in Canada little or  
nothing is heard. Why, then, is a  
width of nearly six feet of silver un-  
dipped for a distance of 150 feet. The  
find is across the lake, and almost di-  
rectly opposite Cobalt station, and as  
indicated, the difficulty of finding  
minerals is the ground has been trod-  
den over by hundreds of prospectors with-  
in the last three years. The property  
belongs to the Nipissing Company, and  
shortly after the find capitalists were  
there in a private car from New York.  
It is going to give a new impetus to  
Cobalt."
