

SYNOD CLOSED.  
King's College Federation  
Scheme Quashed By Big  
Majority.

Governors Recommended to Recon-  
sider (and Make Further Efforts  
in Way of Organization Before  
Closing of the College.

The thirty-fourth annual session of the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton completed its work yesterday afternoon after four days' meetings. The principal business of the day was a discussion upon the King's College federation scheme, the resolution favoring which was finally turned down by a vote of 22 to 16.

APTEENNOON SESSION.

The first business of the afternoon session was the consideration of a draft act of assembly for the removal of the present King's College. The motion, seconded by Rev. H. Montgomery, that the act be referred to the special committee on printing, constitution, canons, etc., and that consideration of the act be deferred until after report of the committee.
