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PARLIAMENT HALL HEARS

Alme Boucher, who sat in the House for ten years, but who was unseated last year for election irregularities, this morning about the by-election in Yamaska which is to be held Oct. 23, came to Ottawa with a majority of "one vote."

With eighteen to twenty thousand voters in most constituencies, the odds of a member getting elected or defeated by a single vote are extremely low. Yet this has happened a number of times since Confederation and once, at least, there was a tie which had to be broken by the returning officer.

A future cabinet minister was beaten by one vote in 1891. It was John Sydney Arthur Fisher, who ran again in 1896, was successful, was chosen minister of agriculture, and held that post during the whole of the Laurier regime. With his leader he went down to defeat in 1911. His seat was Brome-Missisquoi, in the eastern townships.

J. H. Leduc, Liberal member, won the riding of Nicolet by one vote in his same election. A Conservative named John Hochelega won the riding of Westworth South by the same margin.

It occurred in the riding of Joliette, Que., in 1887. E. Guibault, Conservative, was elected by one vote, the same number as his Liberal opponent. The returning officer cast the deciding vote in his favor.

It was the most remarkable of all the "one vote" ridings of Victoria motored to Bangor on business Friday.

The Jobless Women In United States

The history of Women in Industry Darkened by Low Wages Paid.

Washington, Aug. 31 — Women at work, the century from 1890 down to the present era, are described in somewhat sombre colors in a brochure issued today by the woman's bureau of distribution at the Chicago Century of Progress.

Eleanor Nelson, author of the information division, author of the brochure, says that the history of women in industry has been darkened by the low wages, the difficult fight for labor legislation, the hard lot of the negro woman worker, and the woman worker of today.

In 1870, less than 15 per cent of all women 16 years of age and over were breadwinners," the bulletin says. "Today 25.3 per cent of such women — one in every four — work for a living. But in too many thousands of cases, at all times, that living has been pitifully inadequate."

"The history of women in industry has been darkened by the low wages, the difficult fight for labor legislation, the hard lot of the negro woman worker, and the woman worker of today.

In 1932, the best available state figures show that New York and Illinois show the lowest average weekly earnings in manufacturing to be \$12.75 and \$12.15 respectively.

The United States industrial conference board gives an even lower estimate of the average weekly wage of women throughout the country, \$11.72.

To show what wages of today mean in the lives of working women the pamphlet cited a New York study showing \$11.83 as the amount received by a woman in a factory, leaving the average working girl but \$2.12 a week for clothing, care, laundry, recreation and all other expenses.

DEPOSED CUBAN PRESIDENT MAY COME TO CANADA

Montreal, Que., Aug. — Though apparently former president Machado of Cuba has British protection in Nassau, the Bahamas, his life must be in constant danger of violence in the opinion of Alexander Fraser, prominent Bahamian, who arrived here by the Canadian National steamship "Lady Somers" for a short visit.

There are Cubans and Cuban sympathizers in Nassau and there must be a good many hot-headed anti-Machadistas. I should be very surprised if some individual or even organized attempt were not made on the former president's life. In the meantime, I understand, he is comfortably installed in one of our leading Nassau hotels, under heavy police protection. Probably he will waste little time now in getting to Canada, where his life would be safer and his person just as safe, I think, from extradition charges.

"OH BOY! WHAT FISHING! — BUT"

Moncton, N. B., Sept. — There is some good fishing at Little River, near Saint John, N. B., in fact there are between a thousand and twelve hundred salmon, some weighing around 25 lbs., just swimming around waiting to be caught. A member of anglers has visited the locality but they did not do any fishing. The salmon are in the retaining pond of the Dominion Fish Hatchery and are being kept until the fall for spawning purposes. In October or November they will be stripped of their eggs and released. The eggs will then be taken to the hatchery maintained at Loch Lomond and hatched by artificial means. Artificial hatching of fish eggs, states the Fish and Game Department of the Canadian National Railways, has shown a steady development and has achieved a success comparable to that attained in the hatching of hens' eggs. Practically 95 per cent of the fish eggs are successfully hatched.

GOOD GARDENING + Fertilizers in the Fall

The use of fall applications of fertilizers has long been an open question, even with established plants. It is true that fertilizers applied in the fall are not available to the plant at that time. Also, there is considerable loss of nutrients due to leaching when applied at this season.

Fertilizers applied in the fall are more beneficial than no fertilizer at all, but spring applications will prove more advantageous as the plants then are in a state to use the nutrients as soon as they become available. Recent experiments with spring and fall applications of fertilizer to elm trees substantiate this fact.
