We hope mercantile men are taking
means to have candidates for the Common
Council pledged to take the harbor out
of the Mayor's keeping. Now is the
time to work for the desired change.
The petty patronage attached to the
harbor management will never be sur-
rendered willingly. Have every seat con-
tested, and support only those who
pledge themselves to vote right on the
harbor question. A watch-the-ameny
committee of the Board of Trade should
be formed for the work in hand, and a
systematized effort made to ensure a
majority of the Common Council for the
desired harbor improvements. The work
might be done quietly, but none the less
effectually.

Mr. Nowlan displayed an intimate
acquaintance with the backwoods when
he said a law to aid thirty settled
school districts would be followed by
the discovery of a vast number of the thin
kind. It is to be feared that distribution
of money under such a law will be an
absolutely unproductive remedy, and do
more harm than good. A district that has
few children needs but a small and in-
expensive schoolhouse. We hope the
Government will not legislate any dis-
tricts into the Provincial poor house.
They are all able to build as large
school-houses as they require.

The Ministerial organs have been
claiming the title New Brunswick
delegation, except three. Mr. Costigan
has written to the Montreal Gazette de-
claring that he is a Government support-
er, and Mr. Moffat said on the hearings
that he would rather not go to Ottawa
than go as the supporter of the Macken-
zie Government. New Brunswick has,
therefore, five independent representa-
tives—Mitchell, Palmer, Donville, Mof-
fat and Costigan. New Brunswick has
the position of honor—she is the banner
Province.

Mr. Smith's plan for reporting the
wise utterances of the Legislative Solon
has been rejected. This is right. The
House should have nothing to do with
reporting—should waste none of the
public money in such a fashion. The
newspapers report all that is really
worth reporting, and they are always
ready to correct mistakes.

Mr. J. M. Le Moine, late President of
the Quebec Historical Society, suggests
the formation of a Literary Society in St.
John. We have charitable societies in
abundance, but no common ground for
literary men to meet on. Can't the
literati be gathered together in some
way?

It is a subject for congratulation that
so few of the members of the Legisla-
ture voted in opposition to the protest
against the unwarrantable meddling of
Parliament with our local legislation.
Mr. Gough could not swallow the Cos-
tigan resolution, even to whittle his
separate school Local Act. Mr. Gough,
Jr., the Telegraph's favorite, thinks the
Costigan resolution all right.

The Assembly Clown has rattled the
bell on his cap early in the session. He
bill for the extension of the present
House of Assembly four years has caused
much anxiety among the three hundred
and ninety-seven St. John candidates for
the House.

It is said that Mr. Gladstone is to
be made a peer. This will be as bad as
making Mr. Tilley a Governor on the
retirement of the late Ministry!

Bennett of the New York Herald has
suggested the fire and police depart-
ments of New York city to establish
soup kitchens for the poor in all the sta-
tions, the soup to be furnished in un-
limited quantities at Mr. Bennett's ex-
pense at the famous restaurant, Delmonico.

LEGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
FREDERICTON, Feb. 14.
After dinner Wedderburn continued his
remarks on the paragraph of the Address
referring to railways: "The export duty,
which was considered of such small im-
portance by some members of the present
House three years ago, has suddenly be-
come of great value in the estimation of
the same gentlemen. He regretted that
by a prevailing custom in reference to
the matter, the Government could not be
reached and necessary information ob-
tained before the passing of the Address.
If the policy of the Government in refer-
ence to the Railway bill promised was like
that outlined in some of the papers he
would hesitate before giving it the en-
dorsement of his vote."
The Attorney General claimed and
showed that it was not customary for the
Government to go into the particulars of
their measures during the passing of the
Address. The money and time spent on
delegations sent to Ottawa to press our
better terms and unjust claims was
well spent, as by keeping the matter be-
fore the Dominion Government and Par-
liament they felt the justice of what we
asked, and were the more disposed to
favor us when opportunity offered. The
feeling had secured the liberal sum which
we are to receive annually in lieu of our
export duty. The same feeling had aided
in inducing the Dominion Government to
arrange the question of the debt between
Ontario and Quebec in consequence of
which New Brunswick received some
\$24,000 annually as interest on the
national debt allowed to her. The delay in
the adjustment of our claims has done us
no harm, as while they were pending the
L. C. Co. eminent had 'a n a b d d
withstand claims for interest made by
the Ottawa Government on account of
our drawing more than was due for our
public services.

In reply to Lindsay, the Attorney Gen-
eral said that interest is now due from
New Brunswick to the Dominion Govern-
ment.
Lindsay spoke in favor of the para-
graph.
Gough thought the Attorney General
rather more reticent than necessary in
refusing to give the information asked
for by Gough.
Gough was glad to hear of the pro-
posed liberality of the Government, but
would like to hear also where the money
would come from.
Gough thought the Government should
press its just claims with a view to their
prompt settlement instead of keeping
some of them hanging in order that
others might be forced to adjustment
which would not otherwise take place.
It was political trickery. He wondered
at the Government referring to the ot-
ter-referenced fact that the claims were still
pending. If their shrewdness and can-
dour did not meet with his approval he
could certainly complain them on their
impudence.
The resolution then passed.
Lindsay attacked the eighth paragraph,
relating to the suggestion of Gough,
concerning the Dominion Government in the
Costigan resolution. In meaning should be
more to the point than to suggest that
the remonstrance made by the New
Brunswick delegates against the resolu-
tion. He knew that the attempt to
part of any one to violate the Constitu-
tion, although it had been modified. As
instance of modification referred to the
"Better Terms" granted to Nova
Scotia, the settlement of the debt of
Ontario and Quebec, and the advance
to New Brunswick in lieu of the export
duty. The Costigan resolution was not
intended to violate the Constitution.
Some of the newspapers had said it was
intended to do so. If the Government
by it to assert, then it would lose his
repute as a statesman.
The Attorney General and the Govern-
ment did hold that the Costigan resolu-
tion was not intended to violate the
Constitution, and what was done in the
matter by the Parliament of Canada was
in strict accordance with the Constitu-
tion.
Adams said that the British North
America Act empowered the Dominion
Government to disallow all acts passed by
the Local Legislature, and asked the At-
torney General to withdraw in his opinion
such was or was not the case.
The Attorney General said that any
act passed by the Dominion Parliament to
control the Governor General in the dis-
allowance of acts of Local Legislatures is
in violation of the Constitution.
Lindsay said the 92d section of the
British North America Act.
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Government meant to add those thinly
settled districts.
The Provincial Secretary gave Nowlan
room for his moderate speech and said
the measure which he assured the House
the Government intended to introduce,
would contain all the information asked
for.
After some further discussion the para-
graph passed.
In reply to Wedderburn, the Secretary
said that it was the Least Governor's
own desire that the "Grand Honor"
should be substituted for "His Excellency"
as applied to himself.
On the closing paragraph, Gough in
response to a suggestion by the Attorney
General referred to the matter of the in-
dependence of Canada and expressing his
conviction in favor of it. He thought
the speech would have contained refer-
ence to the codification of the laws, the
improvement of the ballot system, the
extension of the franchise, the Legisla-
tive Union of the three Maritime Pro-
vinces, and other important subjects
which he trusted would have the early
attention of the Government.
On motion of Butler the usual resolu-
tion was passed for the engrossing of the
Address, and at the suggestion of Gough,
seconded by the Attorney General, the
whole House was appointed a committee
to wait for his Honor and present the ad-
dress to him.
A committee was, on motion of Butler,
appointed to wait on his Honor to ac-
cept when he would be pleased to receive
it.

Shipping Notes.
The brig "Veteran," of Liverpool, N. S.,
Hudson, master, at New York, 12th inst.,
from Para, reports having been up to lat.
22 N., in seven days; from thence had
strong northerly gales and heavy seas;
was 13 days north of Hatteras, with heavy
N. E., and N. W. gales; on the 10th inst.,
while heaving the vessel to, was struck
by a heavy sea, which carried away jib-
boom and was obliged to cut away all the
gear attached to it; on the 7th inst.,
spoke the ship New Era, from Savannah
for New York, which supplied them with
provisions.
The bark "Annie Durrell," Blauvelt, mas-
ter, before reported ashore at Tybee,
still remained on the 9th inst. The ves-
sel was not in a dangerous position, and
would be got off as soon as the weather
moderated sufficiently for tugs to work
on her.
The bark "Merion," which sailed from
Sydney, C. B., on the 13th Jan. for New
York, and for the safety of which some
uneasiness had been felt, arrived at the
latter port on Saturday the 14th inst.,
with head of forecast gone. She has
been chartered for Liverpool with oil,
at which port she will be sold for the
benefit of the underwriters.
The brig "Lulu," Givan master, made
the passage from New York to Matanzas
in 9 days. She is chartered for North
of Havana, 24 for Matanzas. The L. is
owned by Messrs. Mills & Jagg of this
city; she has been, since her launching,
one of the most fortunate vessels sailing
out of this port.
The schooner "The Star," Telegraphic
office from Portsmouth, N. H., reports
the T. S. in a very bad condition. Her
cargo of 300,000 fresh herring is said to
