Galt Makes \$11,625
By a double deal in Victory Bonds,
Galt has made a profit of \$11,625. In
1917 the City Council invested \$100,000
in the loan issue of that year, buying
five per cent. bonds for 98. Feeling
that it had all civic funds it could
invest in bonds at present the Coun-
cil decided to put the 1917 issue on
the market and purchase 1919 bonds.
The 1917 bonds have just been sold to
Wood, Gundy Co., Toronto, at 100 1-8,
the city making \$4,125 on the deal,
and it will purchase \$100,000 worth of
bonds, which at 5 1-2 per cent. is an
increase in interest of \$500, compared
with the other bonds, thus making
for the city \$7,500 in fifteen years.
