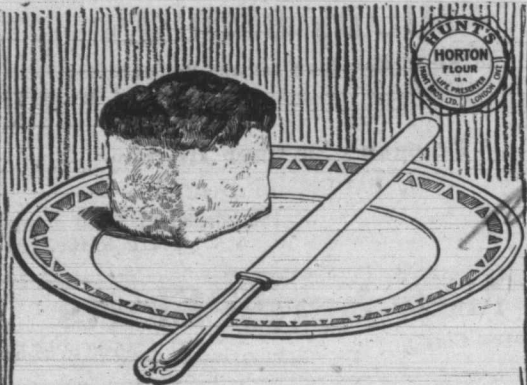

### If Nehemiah Should Come

To the Editor:

Sir,—When Nehemiah, in the olden time, came to oversee the rebuilding of Jerusalem, he found a prevalence of heathen customs, particularly in the matter of Sabbath desecration. If he should come to Kings County, N. S. today, he would find a similar condition of affairs. In 445 B. C. he "saw some treading wine-presses on the Sabbath, and bringing in sheaves, and lading asses—also men of Tyre, which brought fish, and all manner of ware, and sold on the Sabbath to the children of Judah and Jerusalem." In 1916 A. D. he would see wares of various kinds brought and sold, the sacred hours given up to sinful pleasure, railways trains in operation, and—perhaps most dreadful of all—members of churches using their vehicles to minister, for filthy lucre, to the illicit desire of the soldiers for pleasure-driving.

If Nehemiah should come to our community he would find a criminal acquiescence in this heathen custom on the part of those who are the custodians of the Sabbath principle. In 445 B. C. the nobles were allowing the desecration to take place without protest, while they shared in the profits. In 1916 A. D., he would find a like acquiescence and profit-sharing.

If Nehemiah should come, he would protest against the desecration, and denounce it as a national menace. In 445 B. C. he "contended with the nobles of Judah and said unto them, what evil thing is this that ye do, and profane the Sabbath Day? Did not your fathers thus, and did not our God bring all this evil upon us, and upon this city? Yet ye bring more wrath upon Israel by profaning the Sabbath." In 1916 A. D. he would urge the application of the same principle, and point to the desecration as inimical to the welfare of the country. And in so doing he would not make allowance for the abnormal conditions created by the war. In 445 B. C. the conditions were abnormal. For years these heathen customs had prevailed, until the people might have argued against a sudden change. In 1916 A. D. he would see in our national crisis an opportunity and appeal to seek the favor of God by the simple rule of keeping his commandments.

We apply the term "Huns" to the Germans by way of characterizing their lapse into barbarism. May they not with equal propriety characterize our desecration of the Sabbath as a reversion to the heathen type? and may not our ruthless trampling upon God's command be as offensive in His sight as the Belgian atrocities?
