Five weeks after a request for financial information, it is still not forthcoming. The requests for the general ledgers of the Cellar Pub and the UNB Student Union initially given to SU Acting VP Finance Duncan Fulton and SU President Kelly Lamrock on December 12, and repeated on January 8, 1996 have yet to be satisfied

The information would require only one key-stroke on the Student Union computer.

"I'll tell Duncan to make it a priority," Lamrock assured The Brunswickan after Tuesday's Council meeting.

The Student Union financial policy states that any member of the Union can access the Union's finances upon three days notice. On the matter of the Cellar information,

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Two executive members of UNB's Surveying Engineering Society have finally met with Duncan Fulton.

President Andrew Laidlaw and Treasurer Kim Kier had said they intended to register a protest with SU Acting VP Finance Duncan Fulton as soon as they can find him around his office.

"We've been trying to get in touch with Fulton since last Friday afternoon by leaving messages at the SU office and by e-mail," said Laidlaw on Tuesday at noon hour.

"So far we have had no luck," said Laidlaw.

Minimum wage was increased January 1, 1996 to \$5.25. It will increase to \$5.50 in July 1996.
