Neptune Will Leave Halifax June 1 For Hudson's Waters.

Ottawa, April 22.—The Government has closed a charter party with Job Brothers, of St. John's, Nfid., for the steamer Neptune to proceed northward with another Hudson Bay expedition in charge of Commander A. H. Low, who made such a successful voyage on the same steamer last season. This year an earlier start will be made, with a view of investigating the ice conditions in Hudson Stratt during the spring, the Neptune to sall from Halifax on June 1.

The Neptune will carry supplies for the steamer Arctic, which wintered at Cape Fullerton. The two vessels will perform summer patrol, the Neptune probably striking north to the entrance of Barrow Strait, where the conditions seemed so favorable last August for making the northwest passage that Commander Low expressed regret that his instructions did not allow him to make the attempt.

\$2,500 GOES TO RONDEAU PARK

Phil. H. Bowyer, M. P. P. Secures Government Aid for Improvements Contemplated

Next Year's Estimates will Include Club House and Hotel -Government to Buy More Land

It is now officially announced that, upon the earnest solicitations of Phil. H. Bowyer, East Kent's popular member, the Government has decided to this year grant \$2,500 for improvements to Rondeau Park. It is also stated that Mr. Bowyer has obtained assurance of a superactical obtained assurance of a substantial grant next year for the erection of grant next year for the erection of a club house and summer hotel, and that the Government will negotiate for the purchase of the land between the Town Line and the Park.

The Ridgetown Dominion (Mr. Bowyer's paper) modestly comments on his work in this connection as follows:—

follows:The people of Kent will be pleased to learn that Mr. Bowyer, member for East Kent, has been successful in having placed in the estimates now before the Legislature the sum of \$2,500, over and above the usual sum required for maintenance, to be used in the improvement of Rondeau Park. While deserving credit for their action in creating Pointe aux Pins a Provincial Park and doing considerable towards its improvement, the opinion has been general that especially since the retirement of the Hon. Mr. Hardy the Government has been a little slose, if not actually parsimonious, in its treatment of the Park. The late Mr. Robert Foresteen

late Mr. Robert Ferguson, when member for East Kent, repeatedly arged Hop. Mr. Davis to be more arged Hoo. Mr. Davis to be more generous, and it was not the former's fault that the Park was practically neglected. 
