BIGGER SCHOOL

Important Changes to the C. G. I. Urged by Inspector—Board Defines Its Position.

Dr. Seath, High School Inspector, was passing through the city yesterday and availed himself to the opportunity of meeting the Collegiate Institute Board in his room at the Hotel Garner. The meeting was arranged in consequence of the low rating of the school in so far as accommodation for the pupils is concerned. It seems that the glass rooms are so crowded that the desks almost reach the teachers' platform, and this feature is very objectionable to the Inspector. There are other questions or matters of complaint with reference to the condition of the floors being uneven and the knots appearing in many places and the condition of the walls and ceilings and the building generally.

The Board intimated that steps would be taken for the purpose of rectifying these matters as soon as possible, but the work cannot go on while the classes are in their rooms. It will be commenced as soon as the holidays begin, and the desks will be sand papered and re-varnished and the whole institution put in as good condition as possible. The crowding of the school is the great difficulty the Board has to contend with at the present time and it seems that, according to the regulations the Inspector has not only to report the crowding of the rooms, but this in itself has a reflex influence upon the other accommodations of the institution. The Inspector considered that the change of the Assembly Room into class rooms was only a make-shift and not a permanent accommodation. The Board had considered this face to face with the problem of extending the premises either in the way of an addition or by an additional building, the additional building being sufficient for accommodating the Commercial form.

The Board in discussing the matter with the Inspector persuaded him that matters should be left as they are, subject to the improvements to be made during the holidays until after the next session of the Local Legislature, when it is hoped that the law will be made absolutely clear with reference to pupils from the county attending school situated in the city. If the legislation is such that the Board consider it in the interest of the taxpayers of Chatham to give notice under the Statute excluding county pupils then such a course will be adopted and the present building and accommodation therein will be sufficient for the city alone. The ratemakers of the city have to furnish the funds for the new building or addition, as the case may be, without any contribution whatever from the county, and the Board of Trustees are of the opinion that matters of such a character should be left in abeyance altogether until they find out what portion of the running expenses of the institution will be paid by the county pupils according to the new High School Act, which they understand is in course of preparation.

E. J. Buzzard Leases the Bungalow and Tries to Arrange for Band Excursions

E. J. Buzzard, of Blenheim, was in the city yesterday trying to arrange for band concerts at Erieau during the coming holiday season.

Mr. Buzzard has leased the Bungalow at Erieau and intends to run an up-to-date establishment at Chatham's popular resort this summer. He stated to The Planet that he has made some extensive improvements to the Bungalow property, which will make a decided improvement upon last year. He has laid three-quarters of a mile of sidewalk and has remodelled the building inside and refitted it throughout. He will open up for business on the third day of June.

The "City of Grand Rapids" will ply on the lake this summer between Cleveland, Port Stanley and Erieau, and these excursions are expected to draw up matters considerably at the Eau. She will make her first trip on the 8th of June.

Mr. Buzzard reports that the railroad is very slow in granting trains for band excursions or even in saying whether or not they will grant them, but he hopes in the course of a few days to make satisfactory arrangements for two band excursions a week from Chatham.

He also speaks encouragingly of the prospects for a successful season at the Eau this summer. The place is gradually assuming its summer appearance and the present indications are that Erieau will be more popular this year than ever before.

AT ST. LOUIS

Dr. A. W. Thornton Returns from Attending the Convention of the Missouri State Dental Association

Dr. A. W. Thornton returned home Monday morning after attending the convention of the Missouri State Dental Association, which has been in session in St. Louis during the past week. He reports a very enjoyable and profitable trip. In conversation with a Planet reporter he said:

"The country through Missouri and the South is very much ahead of the country in Canada as regards vegetation. I saw large fields of corn in Southern Illinois which were already cultivated, and the potatoes there are all out in blossom. The wheat and rye is in head and the strawberry season is at its height. The convention was very successful and was held in the dental department of the Washington University. One feature which marked a distinct step in advance was the use of an original lantern for projecting pictures on a screen. The lantern is a simple apparatus, the lens being an ordinary photographic lens. No photograph was necessary, the picture being taken directly from the anatomical section. The apparatus used is the invention of a priest in St. Louis, and any picture can be thrown on the screen by simply holding the object in front of the machine."

Dr. Thornton was the only Canadian dentist present at this convention. He delivered an address and a clinic on crown and bridge work.
