## WHAT HART SAYS

There is much difference of opinion about the cause of the grand Conservative victory in Muskoka. When we say that we mean that the difference in opinion is in expressed opinion—there is no difference whatever in real opinion. Our friends the Grits attribute their defeat to everything but the real cause—Gamey. But Dr. Hart, the Liberal candidate who was defeated—and who apparently includes honesty in his long list of good points—and who has had ample opportunity to know, and does know, what went on in the riding during the campaign and election, does not hesitate to attribute his defeat to the speeches made by the much abused Man from Manitoulin. Dr. Hart, interviewed by the Toronto Telegram, said:

"There can be no doubt but that the influence of that man Gamey had considerable effect on the result."

"He came in here in his bombastic way and made his charges to many in the rural districts. They were new, and these were carried away before there was an opportunity for us to make explanations or expose the author of the infamy."

"I believe myself that his charges are a lie from the beginning, and had we had more time to answer him the result would have been different."

"I believe the visit of Hon. J. R. Stratton had a beneficial effect, but at the same time it must be admitted that in many places where we had speakers to follow Gamey, it did not seem to do much good. Where he spoke the vote was heaviest against me. In the north end of the riding I made my canvass early, and even Conservatives admitted that I would get two votes to Mahaffy's one. Then Gamey went into these places and the falling off was evident. Men told me that they would do anything for me, but that it was the government they were after. They said it had been in power too long, and there were the Gamey and other charges, and they would not 'go it.' They thought they were going to carry the Son, and North Renfrew as well. I do not think the Crossin affidavit had any effect. It came too late. People asked why if these wild statements of Gamey's were not true he was not arrested and put in jail, and before we could explain, it was too late."

"I am convinced that if the people had more time to consider and investigate the charges the results would have been different. I must confess that the result surprised me, but there were other influences at work, influences which contributed to Mahaffy's majority, at Bracebridge and surrounding districts which I will not mention. At the same time it cannot be denied that the Conservatives made gains in the lists, and there are grave doubts as to the impartiality of Judge Mahaffy, the candidate's brother, in their revision."

The doctor added that he did not think there would be a protest. His name is already mentioned in connection with the Liberal nomination for Dominion house.

## WHAT IT MEANS

The British empire may be regarded as a big commercial partnership in which the wealth invested is \$2 billion dollars, points out the Ottawa Citizen. In that partnership the investment of the several partners may be put down in billions as follows:

Great Britain.....	75
India.....	3
Canada.....	1-3
Australia.....	1-6
South Africa.....	1-2
Other colonies.....	1
Total.....	82

The colonies pay their own particular running expenses while Great Britain expends enormous sums annually for her own and the general running expenses of the concern. This year the naval expenditure is about \$160,000,000; army \$365,000,000; foreign and colonial civil service \$18,000,000; total \$548,000,000. Under the usual business equity the partners in a firm contribute to the general expenses in proportion to their interest in the concern. On the present working basis it would be fair for the colonies to deduct from their proportion of the general expenses the amounts that they expend on the same services at home and of which the empire generally secures a benefit. If, however, the pro rata cost of the services above mentioned were apportioned to the empire according to its stake in the general community of interest it would work out roughly as follows:

Great Britain.....	\$487,000,000
India.....	19,500,000
Canada.....	8,600,000

This is chiefly interesting as an example of the distribution of obligations from a purely business standpoint under the present relations. And to the manner in which these obligations should be discharged it is quite another matter. Most Canadians would prefer to have the money, if it was expended, spent in Canada and there is no doubt that it could be expended to much better advantage here than by contributing it to the imperial treasury, even if the vital principle of taxation without representation were not involved. This year the total expenditure of Canada on its militia will be \$3,750,000 including public works such as the erection of armories, etc. The comparison will prove of value as illustrating in a measure what would be meant by Canada paying its share of the cost of empire.

Liberal Candidate Hart puts it exactly right. He says that the Muskoka people said to him, "Personally you are all right, but we can't stand for the Government you support." And that is exactly what the matter is.

Before the election the Toronto Globe said:

"Mr. Gamey is the chief platform supporter of the Conservative candidate in Muskoka. The electors are asked there to regard him as a persecuted man, bounded by two unjust judges. It will be interesting to learn Muskoka's answer to his appeal."

But, since the election, the Globe has given no sign that it found Muskoka's answer irresistibly interesting.
