On motion, the Order of the Day was read, and also, the Petition of the Reverend James Robson, William Black, and others, and thereupon,

On motion, the Houfe refolved itself into a Committee of the whole Houfe, on the confideration of the faid Petition.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Wells took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had made fome progress in the business to them referred, and that the Committee had directed him to move for leave to fit again on the confideration of the fame, which Report the House agreed to.

Then the Houfe adjourned until Seven of the Clock, Post Meridian.

The Houfe met agreeably to adjournment.

Mr. Mortimer reported from the Committee appointed to joint a Committee of His Majefty's Council, to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, on the subject of the Fisheries of the Province; that the joint Committee had drawn up an Address accordingly, which he read in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read and is as follows:

## To His Excellency Lieutenant-General the Right Honourable

## GEORGE, EARL OF DALHOUSIE,

Baron Dalhousie of Dalhousie Castle, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief in and over His Majesty's Province of Nova-Scotia, and its Dependencies, &c. &c.

The Address of His Majesty's Council and House of Assembly,

## May it please Your Excellency :

That His Majefty's Subjects, the People of this Province, anxioufly hope that His Majefty's Government will take effectual fleps to prevent Foreign Fifhing Veffels from reforting, under any pretence, to the harbours, rivers, creeks, and bays, on the fea coaft of Nova-Scotia, and fuch parts of the flores of the Bay of Fundy, as are within His Majefty's Dominions, and of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Prince Edward Island, Cape Breton, and the Magdalen Islands, the Labrador Shore, and the Straits of Belliss; and also, to prohibit them from taking Fifh of any kind within the faid harbours, bays, rivers and creeks, or upon the Banks and Shores, contiguous thereto.

Whatever right Foreigners may have to take Fifh in the open waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the People of this Province conceive they cannot have a right to enter the faid Gulf, through the narrow Strait or Paffage which leparates Nova-Scotia from Cape Breton, it being unquestionably a part of the Territory of the Crown, into which Foreigners can have no right to enter, as it is an Arm of the Sea, extending in length between both shores about twenty-one miles, and in width not more than one mile in the widest part, and about half a mile in the narrowest part; and Foreigners, if excluded from this inlet, can have no right to complain, as they have free access into the faid Gulf through the open fea that lies between Cape-Breton and Newfoundland; and the People of this Province confider the Straits of Bellifle, in like manner, the exclusive property of the Crown.

That His Majefty's Subjects, the People of this Province, are of opinion that Foreigaers have no more right to pais into the Gulf of St. Lawrence or into the Bay of Fundy,
