Rev. Mr. Locke Gets After the Laurier Government for Their Broken Promises.

The first of a short series of sermons on the life of Jacob was delivered last evening in the Victoria Avenue Methodist church by the pastor. The subject was, "The twin brothers bargain brought up to date."

What is the difference between such a man and a highway robber? Both take advantage of the helpless circumstances of their victims to force from them what is unjust, and who will say that they will not stand together in the day of retribution having the same penalty. The Bible declares that the extortioner shall not inherit the kingdom of God. The same spirit is displayed in the case of the man who takes advantage of the depraved appetites of his brother in order to increase his cash. In the liquor traffic we have an example of this. NEXT POPE MAY BE AN ENGLISHMAN.

His Present Holiness Not Expected to Last Long—The Germans Favor Cardinal Vaughan as His Successor.

London, April 10.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says:—"While the Pope's health has improved, few deny that his life is slowly ebbing away. Cardinal Parocchi (Bishop of Porto and Santa Rufina and vicar-general of His Holiness), in an interview, said that, in spite of the advice of his physicians, the Pope, if his strength permits, will receive the congratulations of that body on the anniversary of his coronation. He even intends to attend the service in St. Peter's on Easter."

PARIS, April 10.—The London correspondent of Le Nation says that the successor to Leo XIII. will be Cardinal Vaughan, Archbishop of Westminster. It is declared that his Eminence was approached recently on the subject, but has not yet given his answer. English Catholics are assured that the election of the English prelate is certain. Germany is said to be the prime mover in this new movement. "What the Kaiser found it impossible to have his favorite cardinal named he is said to have turned in and worked for Cardinal Vaughan. Fully one-third of the Italian Cardinals are said to be favorable to his candidacy. Three French members of the Sacred College are also laboring to bring over the other French cardinals to support Mr. Vaughan. Reports that reach Paris as to the Pontiff's health continue to be contradictory, but the best informed circles here are perfectly convinced that his Holiness is slowly passing away."

AN AFFECTING INTERVIEW.
Rome, April 10.—Further particulars regarding the farewell audience accorded Archbishop Ireland by the Pope on Wednesday last, show that it lasted half an hour and was of a most cordial nature throughout. The Pontiff strove to prove his great esteem of the Archbishop and the friendly feeling he had for him. He congratulated the Archbishop upon having been chosen by the French episcopate to reach the gaugerie of Jean of Arc on May 7, and said, smiling sadly: "I hope to see you again, but if God takes me before your return, remember I have always felt fatherly love and interest in yourself and all American Catholics, to whom I send my blessing." Both the Pope and Archbishop Ireland were greatly affected.

LET THERE BE LIGHT.
Sir Arthur Richardson has called the attention of the Planet to the necessity of having an electric light placed at the corner of Holy Trinity church, on Victoria avenue.
