NEW TURN TO IRISH ISSUE

Leaders of Unrest and Seditious in Country Placed Under Arrest

HUNDREDS IN CHARGE

Comprehensive Dragnet Drawn by Soldiers and Police for Sinn Feiners

London, May 20.—The Government has adopted the policy of the Iron Hand in dealing with seditious in Ireland. All the leaders of the Sinn Fein Society have been arrested by a swift and comprehensive dragnet drawn by the police and soldiers during the night and early hours of the morning. The movement was apparently a complete surprise, and most of those arrested were quickly and quietly placed aboard ships.

The dragnet swept all over the country and there was no possibility of resistance. The majority of those arrested were taken from their homes while abed, and only a few scuffles and a little revolver spay were made. According to latest reports, hundreds of arrests were made.

Centres**, **Denis McCullough**; **Peter Hughes**, Chairman of Dundalk Urban Council; **P. P. Curran** (recently out of jail); **Thomas Hunter**; **Joseph McGrath**; **Patrick O'Keefe**; **Sean Milroy**, defeated candidate for East Tyrone for Co. Carmon; **Sean McGarry**, Thomas Keefe; **Wm. McKelvey**; **Wm. Co. grave**, Sinn Fein M. P. for Kilkenny; **Dr. McNabb** of Belfast, taken while en route in East Cavan; **Peter Clancy**, Editor Southern Star, of Skibbereen; **Tadgo Barry**.

A despatch from Dublin states that 23 arrests have already been made there and that reports of arrests in the provinces came from Galway, Cork, Sligo, Athlone, Dundalk, Cashel, Ennis, Skibbereen, Kilkenny, Tullamore, Drogheda, Droghda, Westport, Longrea and Roscommon. Men employed in the East Cavan election campaign have also been arrested.

The latest turn of the kaleidoscope of the complicated Irish situation has surprised the whole of Britain as completely as it did its victims. Only a few weeks ago Lloyd George's War Cabinet proposed to settle the Irish question by coupling Home Rule with conscription. It seemed for a time that both factions would be placated by that plan, but after a short agitation it appeared that both were excited to greater antagonism than had existed before.

The Nationalists questioned whether the Home Rule offer was not a screen for conscription; the Ulsterites insisted that conscription was only a device for thrusting Home Rule on the Irish. A quarrel among Irishmen settled back into the old time-war rut.

Position of Nationalists.

The general interpretation of the Government's new plans read from the Viceroy's proclamation is that conscription will be sidetracked for a time, while a case for voluntary enlistment is tried.

The latest development places the Nationalist party in an embarrassing position. John Dillon and his followers have withdrawn from Parliament and joined the Sinn Feiners and the Ulsterites in their conscription. If the Sinn Fein is proved to be in conspiracy with the Germans the Nationalists must drop their new alliance, because the Nationalists never have been pro-Germans, nor even anti-British, but only Home Rulers.

Ground for Justification.

The proclamation by the new Viceroy states that the arrests were made because a plot with Germany was being fostered. This gives the Government ground for justification. The Sinn Fein movement has been for a long time in a state of defiance of all civil laws and war prohibitions, but the Sinn Fein leaders, except in the case of oratorical outbreaks, have not identified themselves with the Germans, and so long as the Sinn Fein appeared to be a purely Irish movement a considerable section of the English people have been disposed to think that the Government might turn a blind eye toward it, and trust to the better elements in Ireland to maintain a balance.

Offered Resistance.

Teddy Driscoll of Skibbereen and five other Sinn Feiners who were in his house, offered stout resistance to arrest. Driscoll was wounded in the arm by a revolver bullet. Pierce McGann, son of Francis McGann, Justice of the Peace for Ballyowen House, Cashel, and President of the East Tipperary Sinn Fein Executive Committee, was arrested Saturday morning. Patrick Hogan, local leader of the Irish Volunteers, succeeded in eluding the police at Cashel by jumping through a window and entering the ground of a convent, from which he made his escape.

Wanted Pet Dog.

Countess Markievicz protested bitterly against her arrest and insisted on taking a pet dog, which wore the Republican colors, along with her.

Tadgo Barry, who has twice been imprisoned already in connection with the revolutionary movement, was arrested and conveyed to Dublin by a strong escort.

Prof. De Valera was in the office last night for a few hours conferring with some of his lieutenants. He left shortly after ten o'clock, taking a train to his home at Greystones where he was arrested. He made no attempt to conceal his surprise.

Surprise Complete.

Some rumors had been in circulation relative to a contemplated swoop by the authorities, but apparently they were unfounded.

Will Camp in Capitals and
Continue Campaign for
Exemption

ESTABLISH A LOBBY

Ottawa, May 18.—The farmers have decided to establish a lobby at the capital. They think that if they can keep a committee at Ottawa which will watch legislation and use their influence with the members they will get more concessions.

Three of the leaders of the agitation which waited on the government this week, have been detailed to camp in the capital and will continue the campaign for a secure exemption of agriculturists from military service. They are Mr. J. J. Morrison, secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario; G. W. Gurney, Paris, and J. H. Kornighan, Goderich.

They are proposing to place every member on record as to his position on the exemption of farmers, and where answers are unsatisfactory they will circulate petitions asking for their resignation.
