Since removing from Athens to Lyn, Mr. William Brown has been seriously ill and is not yet able to resume his position on the B. & W. His condition is causing his friends great anxiety.

Merchants and others should watch for these coins as it is improbable that the counterfeit broke his mould after a first offence.
