PAVING PETITION.

Ald. Stephens Complains That he Has Been Misre-presented.

The Facts of the Case and Petition in Full as Presented to the Council.

The Planet has received from Ald. George Stephens, through his solicitor J. B. Rankin, Q. C., a complaint that an article which recently appeared did him an injustice. The article, which was a communication, was headed "Strong Protest." What Mr. Stephens complains of is that this article accuses him of signing a paving petition to the government, asking to have the cost of the King street pavement saddled on the whole city. Mr. Rankin's letter asserts that this is a false statement and requests such correction as the records of the city council will show. The Planet very cheerfully complies with the request. It is not going, if it can help it, to quarrel with Mr. Stephens over election matters. It is not opposing him personally, but the men at Ottawa, and their policy, which he represents. The Planet might add that if during the campaign anything appears which Mr. Stephens thinks is unfair to him he need not go to the trouble of complaining against it by legal process. All he has to do is to call up over his telephone, and he can have any fair explanation asked for. The columns of The Planet are as freely open to Mr. Stephens as to any other reader, and while it proposes on principle to encompass his defeat if it can it will not knowingly on any occasion publish anything detrimental to him which could not under ordinary circumstances be considered fair campaign literature.

As for this paving petition it may be explained that a resolution was passed by the city council to apply to the Government for a local amendment to the frontage tax law. This amendment was to permit the council if it saw fit to assess the cost of paving the highways into the city to the general tax fund. Subsequently the city council ordered the laying of a pavement on King street on the initiative. The following petition was then circulated against the laying of this pavement:

THE PETITION.
To the Mayor and Council of the City of Chatham:

Whereas public notice has been given by the Municipal Council of the City of Chatham, that, pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Act, in that behalf, said Municipal Council intend to construct a vitrified brick pavement to be laid on a concrete bed, on King street, from the Post Office to William street, after the expiry of one month after the last publication of said notice, the assessment of the cost of such work to be made on the real properties to be benefited thereby, unless the majority of the owners of such real properties, according to the last revised assessment roll, representing at least one-half in value thereof, petition the council against the same within one month after the last publication of this notice of the intention of the council to undertake the said work, which notice was last published Feb. 1, 1900.

Now, therefore, the petition of the undersigned owners of real properties fronting on King street, humbly sheweth:

1. That the said King street is at present in a fairly good state of repair and by an annual expenditure of a small sum thereon might be kept in good repair for a term of one or two years.

2. That it is inequitable for the said Municipal Council to force the work upon the owners of the real property fronting on that portion of King street to be paved as aforesaid, unless all the streets in the said city are to be suitably paved concurrently therewith.

3. That your petitioners are informed that a resolution has been

passed by the said Municipal Council to petition the government of the Province of Ontario to enact such legislation as would enable said council to assess the cost of the construction and repair of the public streets of the city upon the total assessable property of the city, and therefore it would be improper for said council to undertake said paving work until after such application to the legislature has been made.

Wherefore your petitioners, being the majority of the owners of said real property fronting said proposed work, and representing at least one half in value thereof, humbly petition your honorable body against the construction of the said vitrified brick pavement at the present time.

Dated at Chatham the 20th day of February, 1900.
Signed to this petition the name "George Stephens" appears thirtyeth.

Britain's Parliamentary Secretary of War Pushed Through a Hostile Mob

Which Finally Cheered Him For His Courage—Unionist Prospects.

London, Sept. 28.—The unionists are still confident of a victory at the forthcoming parliamentary general election, but there is an undercurrent of apprehension that the party will be returned to power with a smaller majority than has been expected. The St. James' Gazette says:

Geo. Wyndham parliamentary under secretary of state for war, who went last evening to speak in favor of the unionist candidate at Battersea, London, had a very hostile reception at the hands of the radicals. He was shouted down by a howling mob and compelled to abandon his attempt to speak, but he pluckily fought this way through the hostile crowd, which, in admiration of his courage, finally cheered him heartily.

TO ABDICATE

King Leopold Will Leave His Throne Says a Paris Report.

Paris, Sept. 28.—"From a source worthy of confidence," says the Courrier du Soir, "we learn that the king of the Belgians, intends to abdicate, before the close of the present Belgian parliament in favor of the prince of Flanders."
