PREACHER CALLED LAWYER A LIAR

Then Both Drew Their Guns and Began to Fire—Former Killed and Latter Wounded.

Williamson, W. Va., Dec. 5.—Yesterday afternoon Hon. S. Davis Stokes shot and instantly killed Rev. John W. Wohl in a street duel here, Mr. Stokes being also dangerously injured. Last night the whole town and even in the country districts the excitement was intense. Mr. Stokes, one of the most prominent young lawyers in Mingo county, left his office yesterday afternoon immediately after dinner, and pleasantly greeting friends on the way, walked with quick and firm steps in the direction of the house occupied by Rev. Mr. Wohl and his house-keeper, Mrs. Levine, Mr. Wohl's family being at the time in the house. He passed her at the door. "You would be much better at present in the house," she laughingly replied that the day was far too pretty for to be spent entirely in doors, and Mr. Stokes interrupted by remarking, "Yes, don't think of leaving us for the house."

Quick as a flash Mr. Wohl turned, and addressing Stokes, said: "Leave the premises." An altercation followed. Both men ran to the sidewalk directly in front of the house. Something was said about a distinguishing mark, that drew from Rev. Mr. Wohl a sharp retort. "You are a liar," and in an instant the report of a revolver was heard. Stokes stumbled, tried to regain his footing, but fell in the street. Wounded as he was he drew his revolver and covered the minister, now within ten feet of his fallen foe. Again Wohl fired and simultaneously with that shot the gun in the sinking hand of Stokes spoke. When the smoke cleared away two men lay in their own blood upon the sidewalk. A crowd ran to the scene. Rev. Mr. Wohl was dead. Chance had carried the bullet from Stokes' pistol through the head of the minister, killing him as he fell. The bullet had entered Stokes' side below the heart and passed entirely through his body. In the hall of the minister's home, facing the fearful duel to the death, fallen across the doorway, was found Mrs. Levine. It was at first thought she was dead and had probably been shot, but an investigation showed that she had only fainted from fright. Up to a late hour last evening Mr. Stokes had refused to say anything concerning the terrible tragedy, and Mrs. Levine is in too much of a state of excitement to talk. Rev. Mr. Wohl was recognized as one of the most forceful and eloquent of Presbyterian ministers of this state. Mr. Stokes is an ex-Virginia university president, and comes from one of the best families of the Old Dominion. It now develops that the tragedy was the outgrowth of strained relations between the two men for a week past. Mr. Stokes, who is one of the leaders of the social set here, saw a cartoon, illustrating a German, given by the Cotillion Club, which Mr. Wohl had used in a sermon. The cartoon pictured a ballroom scene, with various paths leading downward to ruin, and among the places shown as a result of the dance was a famous "resort." In some way the cartoon had come into the possession of Mr. Stokes, who afterward meeting Rev. Mr. Wohl, told him that if it were not for his cloth he would thrash him. Rev. Mr. Wohl retorted that Stokes need not hesitate on that account as he was ready to meet him at any time. Late last night Mrs. Levine was prevailed upon to talk, and in her statement she does much to remove the blame heretofore laid upon Stokes.

COUNTY COUNCIL.

A Charge Made Against Provincial Detective Campeau.

He is Said to Have Taken Two Harwich Farmers Into Custody Under Peculiar Circumstances.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

It was three o'clock yesterday afternoon when the county council resumed, the interval having been utilized to visit the jail building with a view to ascertaining the advisability of removing certain inmates. Ex-Warden Mills, of Chatham township, who was present, was invited to the platform.

Dr. Charteris, physician to the House of Refuge, submitted his semi-annual report, showing the house to contain 25 males and 10 females. Since June last the doctor had made 30 visits. But one death had occurred. The sanitary arrangements were good, with the exception of the cistern. The report concluded with a recommendation as to the cleanliness of the inmates.—Report adopted.

On motion, Jas. S. Waugh was heard regarding a claim against the county for some 10,400 bricks, which was upon his land at the time it was sold to the county for the house of refuge, and utilized by the corporation. Mr. Waugh asked the payment therefor or that he be asked the county to erect the line fence between the properties.

Mr. Widdow, Chairman of the House of Refuge Committee, said the way for Mr. Waugh to adopt, was to erect his share of the fence and whatever brick the county had utilized would be paid for.

Messrs. Leverton & McCoy endorsed this view of the matter.

On motion of Messrs. Gosnell and McCoy the matter was left in the hands of the House of Refuge Committee.

Moved by Messrs. Leverton and Gosnell that a sum of \$250 be paid to Bothwell town on the amount paid by them for the new Moravian bridge.—Finance.

Moved by Messrs. Wilson and Caughill that the treasurer be asked to furnish a full statement of debenture debt and bank overdraft to the council.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. VonGuntion and Rankin, that the council offer a reward of \$50 for the arrest of the thieves doing the grain stealing throughout the county.

Mr. VonGuntion explained that the farmers around Charing Cross were "fairly terrorized" at present with grain thieves.

The motion was referred to the county property committee.

A by-law to confirm by-law No. 363 of Zepes township, for the closing of a portion of the roads in the said township, was then read and adopted for the first time. It was introduced by Messrs. Leverton and Gosnell.

Before adjournment the warden issued his invitation to the annual banquet at Hotel Rankin on Thursday evening.

THURSDAY MORNING.

On the opening of council this morning the Warden explained that Mr. Robinson had been called home by a telegram, but would be present at the afternoon session. All the other members were present.

Chairman Gosnell of the committee on Packer Creek bridge, reported that the committee had met that of Lambton county, and had decided to build a new bridge at Florence at the joint expense of the two counties. It was a superstructure with oak plank flooring. The bridge work was done by the Kincaidine Co. and approached by H. Graydon, under plans prepared by Mr. McGee.

Kent's share of the expense was \$702.21 being half of the total cost.—Report adopted.

The report of the Board of Criminal Audit was submitted by Messrs. Gosnell and Fleming, showing the following result of the audit:

The report was adopted. The Warden said there had been some complaints concerning the reduced mileage. He thought the matter should be investigated.

Messrs. Wilson, Hickey, Gosnell and VonGuntion pointed out that the board always dealt leniently with the constables.

Under the head of enquiries Mr. VonGuntion asked what was going to be done concerning the salary of the High Constable, which he believed should be raised.

Mr. Wilson gave notice of motion to grant him an extra \$50.

MAKES A CHARGE.
Mr. VonGuntion preferred a charge against Provincial Detective Campeau alleging that in connection with the recent grain robberies in the South of Harwich, he had instructed the arrest of two respectable farmers, who were handcuffed, brought to town, left in jail over night, and then released without trial or explanation.

Mr. VonGuntion said he had written Hon. David Mills in the matter, but thought that the council should take action.

Mr. Hickey thought that owing to Campeau being a provincial officer, the complaint should be submitted to the Attorney General.

Mr. Leverton asked what was the sanitary defect of the basement of Harrison Hall, as mentioned in Dr. Bray's communication of Tuesday.

The Warden referred the matter to the Property Committee to look into and investigate.

Moved by Messrs. Hickey and Marshall that the House of Refuge Committee be appointed to hear Dr. Hickey in the case of Mrs. Cole, and report.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Caughill and Williamson, that Engineer McGee be instructed to prepare plans for the new south approach to Kent Bridge.—After considerable discussion the matter was left in abeyance to decide what part of the work, the county will assume.
