# JAP LOSSES ARE 40,000

Mikado's Men Who Have Gone Down in Front of Port Arthur.

Assault On the Fortress After Six Days of Continuous Fighting Ceased On Thursday of This Week-Conflicting Reports Emanate From Che Foe, and Bennett Burleigh of Dally Telegraph Says Al Was Quiet On Friday Morning.

Shanghai, Nov. 5 .- Advices reach ing Shanghai yesterday say that the Japanese assault on Port Arthur continues with unabated vigor and that the Russian defence is dogged and determined.

The northern portion of East Keek-wan Mountain has been captured by the Japanese, who hold it under a furious Russian fire.

A fort on the inner line of defences was destroyed by the explosion of a magazine on Nov. 2. The casualties of the Japanese are reported to be

A belief prevails that the Russian warships will make another attempt

The British steamer Victoria, which The British steamer Victoria, which succeed in running the Port Arthur blockade with a full cargo of beef and has returned here, confirms the reports that the Japanese have captured all the main northern positions of the fortress.

#### Japs Have Lost 40,000.

Che Foo, Nov. 5.—Chinese who left Port Dalny Thursday evening releft Port Dainy Thursday evening re-port that batches of wounded were passing through Dainy. They report also that during the recent battle fresh Japanese troops were constant-ly going to the front. It is reported that the Japanese killed or wounded in front of Port Arthur during the last three months approximate forty thousand thousand.

Information has been brought by Chinese that the six days of bombardment and desperate efforts on the part of the besiegers to take the fortress of Port Arthur ceased Wednesday. The Japanese took fort No. 3, but were unable to hold it.

# Conflicting Reports.

London, Nov. 5.—Conflicting reports emanate from Che Foo regarding the result of the latest assault on Port Arthur. Bennett Burleigh of The Daily Telegraph, who passed the fortress in a steamer, says that all was quiet at 6 o'clock Friday morning, and that there was no sign of firing or of any there was no sign of firing or of any movement. His steamer was thrice chased and boarded by Japanese within a brief period, the Japanese forbidding any navigation within twenty miles of Port Arthur.

### Stoessel's Last Stand

Rome, Oct. 5.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Giornale di Roma asserts that General Stoessel in command at Port Arthur, has telegraphed the Czar that he has made his last attempt to defend the forts to the northwest of the city, and is now preparing to retire to Laiotishan and the Tiger's Tail pen-insula with 10,000 soldiers and sea-

Artillery Fight. Mukden, Nov. 5.—There was a brisk exchange of artillery fire here Thurs-day, extending from the 'village of Linchintoun eastward on both sides of the railroad, but the firing ceased

at noon.
The Japanese are continuing their concentration opposite the Russian centre. The Japanese positions along their whole line are strongly fortified and they are now entrenching along the Hun River to the westward:

On Monday, on the Russian extreme right, a squadron of Don Cossacks charged a battery of Japanese artil-lery near Lidentoun. The Cossacks went forward at a gallop through a field of uncut millet against the fir of the battery, and had almost reached the guns when a couple of companies of Japanese infantry rose up and poured in several volleys, compelling the cavalrymen to ride out of the field at an even faster pace than they went in it. The Cossacks lost about twenty-five men.

#### Japs Use Dogs.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 5.—A special despatch from Mukden says the Japanese are using dogs to locate the positions of the Russian sentinels and outposts.

#### BRITISH SHIPS SAIL. Four Have Been Ordered to Leave Gibral tar At Once.

Gibraltar, Nov. 5.—The battleships Victorious, Magnificent, Illustrious and Jupiter have been ordered to put to sea immediately. It is believed they will proceed westward. Russians At Tanglers.

Tangier, Nov. 5 .- The ships of the Russian second Pacific squadron now here sailed at 6 o'clock this morning. Their destination has not been disclosed.

#### Certainly Not Permissable,

London, Nov. 5.—Foreign Secretary Lansdowne, in a letter dated Nov. 3, has informed a British shipowning firm that "It is not permissible for British owners to following the Russian fleet with coal," The letter was in reply to a direct query from the firm which drew the attention of the Foreign Office to the British. Collier Roddem, which was then lying at Vigo awaiting the larrival of the Russian squadron, and asked if British owners were entitled to charter their vessels for this purpose.

French Steamers in Collision Off the Coast of Algeria.

Accident Took Place Twenty-Three Mile From Bona, Algeria, Near Herbillon, and the Gironde Sank After the Impact With the A. Schlaffino-The Giron e Had 110 Passengers, 100 of Whom Were Algerian Natives.

Bona, Algeria, Nov. 5.-A hundred persons were drowned Thursday steamer Gironde, after having been in collision with the French steam miles from Bona. The Gironde left Bona with, 110 passergers, of whom 100 were Algerian natives.

#### Two Drown.

Windsor, Nov. 5 .- The nine-monthsold son of William N. Wheeler of this city was terribly burned about the face and head at his parents home here Thursday night by the explosion of a lamp. He had been put to bed apparently asleep, but evidently awoke and dragged a lamp on the bedding. The child's screams at tracted the attention of his parents in time to save his life.
