The return asked for by Colone Matheson, giving details of the pay. ment of tthe wages to the working men at Sault Ste. Marie, was laid

on the table of the Legislature on Monday by the Provincial Secretary. It is an interesting document. The amount disbursed is in the neighborhood of two hundred and sixty thousand dollars and the recipient number four thousand one hundred. It will be remembered that the

peculiar hardships that followed the suspension of the operations at the Soo were unged as a reason for the special intervention of the Govern-ment on behalf of the distressed working men, Hundreds, we are told, had come down from the bush without a dollar in their pockets and were dependent upon the charity of the people of the Soo for their immediate needs.
