Pardon a seeming dictation as to your duty in reference to Prohibition, now being canvassed in the country, when we say you have no other course to pursue, than to work for, encourage and support the movement. The passage of a prohibitory law, is of the deepest interest to the jewels of your homes. Perhaps these lines will be read by a father who has suffered from the effects of the liquor habit himself or who is now a slave to strong drink, or who is perhaps endeavoring on the question. Father, will you solemnly and seriously answer the following question?

You have some boys growing up, and they give you every promise of comfort and joy as they advance in years;—or perhaps the little fellow is now toddling around home, in all the purity and innocence of childhood's early years. The boy growing up is now exposed to the temptation of the liquor saloon, and in a few years the little innocent prettler would be. Once entering the saloon, they are in the way of acquiring the habit of drink, and they enter the path of the drunkard. Father, which of your boys do you want to fall a victim to the damning liquor habit? Your first-born, in whom you and your wife have cherished so many hopes?—or the little tottler today who now affords to much joy and happiness by his cute and winning ways?—or the lad, bright and promising, who is beginning to be useful about home—mother's joy, papa's pride—as his first help is given them? Father, which one of these boys, who have such a warm place in your loving heart, and whose every interest and happiness is now and always will be your deepest concern—which one are you ready to sacrifice to the demon strong drink? Which one of these boys do you want to see hilarious over his cup, or reeling along the road, or in the streets, or muttering the meaningless jargon of the drunkard, or filling the atmosphere and making the night hideous with the whoops, howls and imprecations of the inebriate? Which one, father—mother! The liquor saloon can only exist as a new material is furnished them from the land, a licensed institution to procure our Province, and degrade our young men. As long as they are licensed by the Province (of which Province each father within its bounds is a citizen and a voter) and by such license are sanctioned and protected, the dangers above presented will exist, and whose boy is going to become the victim of the liquor habit, sanctioned and protected by the votes of the fathers in the Province? Somebody's boy will be entrapped. Will it be yours?

These dangers threatening your boy, call upon every father to act now, while the opportunity is afforded, and to act on the side of prevention, for in no other way you secure safety for your loved one. Neglect the opportunity, and the responsibility of a drunken son may be laid at your door.

Mother, sisters, daughters,—you are more deeply interested in this issue than any others. You are the noble sufferers from the curse of strong drink. Your loved ones are the victims of the liquor habit. Before long the aggression of the people on the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic in this country will be given at the ballot box. Your influence is a power; use it for prohibition. Pray for prohibition—work for prohibition—urge your friends and loved ones to vote for prohibition—and thus help to gain a victory for God, for home, for native land.—Temperance Journal.
