**PUBLICITY BUREAU FOR NOVA SCOTIA**

Organization to Promote Province Development and Tourist Trade Formed at Halifax Convention Last Week

With its aims to promote the cause of tourist traffic and generally encourage the development of Nova Scotia, the Nova Scotia Publicity Bureau, sponsored by the Halifax Board of Trade was officially brought into being at a provincial convention held at Halifax on Thursday of last week.

The establishment of the Bureau is province-wide, the provincial provincial directorate appointed being representatives of all counties. Without exception, delegates who attended pledged the support of their respective communities to the project and the task of getting the Bureau into working order at the earliest possible date will be commenced at once.

Optimistic statements regarding the tremendous opportunities for Nova Scotia in the tourist business, featured the series of addresses delivered at the convention, in which all present participated. It was generally conceded, however, that the wholehearted support of the people of the province will be necessary to make the undertaking a complete success.

"The development of the province will be of benefit to every nook and corner," said D. Macgillivray, Superintendent of the Canadian Bank of Commerce for the Maritimes and Newfoundland. "Therefore the municipalities and counties should contribute their share of the expense incurred in its promotion."

"There is not a business man of the province who can truthfully say that he does not benefit from tourist trade," said F. G. J. Comeau, Vice-President of the Halifax Board of Trade. "Let everyone give his share, and let us leave this convention with the idea that we are going to sell Nova Scotia."

Already the Publicity Bureau have secured pledges from Halifax business firms and transportation companies for \$5,000, and in addition to this they have obtained from Premier Armstrong the indication that the government will contribute \$10,000 on the condition that an equal amount is raised by public subscription.

The following articles and memorandum of association were submitted to the meeting:

The name of the Company is "Nova Scotia Publicity Bureau."

The objects for which the Bureau is established are:

(A) To afford to its members and patrons all the usual privileges, conveniences and accommodations of a Bureau of information and publicity.

(B) To encourage, promote and pay for the writing of pamphlets, articles or books, tending to advertise the lands, natural resources, climate, summer resorts, hotels, watering places, towns and cities of Nova Scotia.

(C) To promote interprovincial, provincial and international tourist traffic.

(D) To give advice and directions to Tourists entering or leaving Nova Scotia.

(E) To encourage the development of Nova Scotia.

(F) To procure and give information in regard to the natural resources and industries of Nova Scotia as well as the advantages to the Tourists visiting Nova Scotia.

(G) To encourage the discovery of and to investigate and make known the nature and merits of inventions which may seem capable of being used by persons engaged in any industry in Nova Scotia.

(H) To construct, execute, carry out, equip, improve, work, develop, manage or control such works or conveniences as may be deemed advisable in carrying out any of the objects of the Bureau.

(I) To encourage the settlement and colonization of Nova Scotia.

(J) To give advice and directions to settlers entering or now located in Nova Scotia.

Every member of the company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of the same being wound up during the time that he is a member or within one year afterwards for payment of the debts and liabilities of the Company contracted before the time at which he ceases to be a member, and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up the same, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors amongst themselves, such amount as is required not exceeding ten (10.00) dollars.

The profits or other income of the Bureau are to be applied solely in promoting its objects and the Bureau shall not pay any dividend to its members, provided that nothing herein shall prevent the payment in good faith of remuneration to any officer or servant of the Bureau or to any member of the Bureau or other person in return for any services actually rendered to the Bureau, nor prevent the payment of interest at a rate not exceeding seven per cent per annum on money borrowed from any member of the Bureau.

## TOWN FATHERS MEET

Wednesday Evening Session Not an Important One—Estimates not yet Ready

At the regular monthly meeting of the Town Council on Wednesday evening, March 4, the only absentee, Council. Peck called attention to the fact that he had been appointed to more than the customary number of standing committees and on motion the name of Council. Reid was substituted on the Poor Committee.

Mr. Stairs reported expenditures for the Water, Streets and Sewer Committees during the month as follows: Water, \$17.40; Streets, \$86.30; Sewer, \$7.95. He also explained to the new members of the Council board certain conditions with which the Poor Committee has to do.

The financial statement for February was presented by Council. Balcom, chairman of the Finance Committee. It showed receipts during the month \$643.49, and expenditures \$2035.13. At the end of the month the bank overdraft amounted to \$10,781.32, as compared with \$15,991.72 at the same time last year.

A letter was read from Mrs. A. H. Johnson asking for a rebate on account of overpaid taxes since 1916, during which time she had not been allowed the widow's exemption provided by law. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee for investigation and report.

The Mayor read a letter which he had received from the Halifax Chronicle regarding a tourist issue which they are about to publish and for which advertising is solicited from the town. No action was taken and the Clerk was instructed to reply accordingly.

## SPLENDID PERFORMANCE BY WOLFVILLE DRAMATIC SOCIETY

Time did not permit us to write a very extensive account for our last issue of the three act comedy, "Thirteen Plus," given by the Wolfville Dramatic Society last Thursday evening.

We did state, however, the performance was exceedingly well presented, and reflected great credit on the actors and Mrs. Eugene Eaton, who staged the production. All the characters were splendidly portrayed, but especial mention must be made of Mrs. Robie Tufts, who took the part of the Irish cook, and never once dropped the part, affording practically all the laughs of the play. ## C. P. R. OFFICIALS ON TOUR OF INSPECTION

Grant Hall, vice-president of the C. P. R. and president of the D. A. R., and C. H. Temple, chief of motive power and rolling stock, C. P. R., Montreal, have been making a tour of inspection over the D. A. R. this past week.

Monday they were entertained by General Manager Geo. E. Graham at the Halifax Club, when Mr. Hall, in a short address stated that his visit here was for the purpose of inspecting the Dominion Atlantic property and arranging for certain renewals and improvements to be made this summer.

The operations during 1923 were disappointing, but it was no reason why the program for 1924 should not be carried out, and it is hoped that results will justify the expenditures. He had something to say about the reduction in train service, and he hoped that business men would understand the reason why curtailment is sometimes necessary. Included in the Dominion Atlantic program is the laying of 25 miles of new heavy rails, and ballasting of certain sections. The Bluenose train service, with new equipment, previously announced, will improve the service in effect last year, and will provide accommodation for the increased tourist travel which the province is certain to develop with the increased efficiency of the Nova Scotia Publicity Bureau.

## ACADIA LOSES TO ST. F. X.

In Deciding Game for Intercollegiate Championship of Maritime Times

TRURO, Feb. 29.—St. F. X. won from Acadia here tonight in the game for the Maritime intercollegiate hockey championship and the Halifax Herald trophy, by a score of 6-2. The better team won, but the Wolfville boys put up a game fight, although it was apparent after the first session that they had no chance to win.

The game was fast and interesting and the 200 Acadia fans who came over by special train made the rink resound with their college yell. The Acadia band furnished music before the game and between the periods. The game did not start until 9:05, owing to a freight train getting off the track at Heatherston and delaying the Sydney express on which the Antigonish boys were travelling.

The St. F. X. squad played good hockey and deserved to win. The Acadia forward line was rather weak and many of their shots were wide. Clark, defence man, was the star for the Wolfville squad. Wright, the Acadia goaler, was disappointing in the first period, but for the rest of the game he put up a great performance, especially in the final session, when he stopped many hard shots. The Acadia defence men took a long lead away from the Wolfville net, and when a St. F. X. player broke through the crowd there was usually no one but Wright to prevent a goal being scored.

Acadia opened the scoring three minutes after the game started, when Clark, after spectacular stick handling drove the rubber through the St. F. X. defence. Four minutes later, Sullivan slipped the rubber past Wright, evening the score. This goal was followed four minutes later by another for St. F. X., made by "Chook" McDonald on a wing shot. Thirty seconds later McDonald repeated on a pass from centre.

At the opening of the second period the Wolfville defence men stuck closer to their net and during this session the forwards put up an improved game. St. F. X. hammered the Wolfville goal in four minutes McKenna stick-handled through and scored from the wing. Eight minutes later Sullivan tallied another for Antigonish by taking the rubber around the net and poking it past Wright. Acadia took many shots at the St. F. X. goal, but failed to score. The territory was evenly divided.

The final period opened with the figures standing 5-1. The Acadia defence men again left their positions and were playing just behind the forward line, leaving half the ice wide open. Some hard shots were turned aside by Wright, who was playing a stellar game. The Antigonish forwards were playing good combination, and in six minutes "Chook" McDonald scored from left wing. Play went into St. F. X. territory, and four minutes later McLatchey netted the disc for the Wolfville boys. This was the final score, although the Antigonish squad continued to hammer Wright hard.

## KENTVILLE BAPTIST CHURCH

Celebrates Fiftieth Anniversary This Week

Monday of this week was the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the Kentville Baptist church and the occasion has been appropriately observed by the members of the congregation.

On Sunday the pulpit was occupied at both services by the Rev. F. W. Peterson, D. D. president of Acadia University. In the morning he spoke on "Living Christianity," which he characterized as the most effective instrument in aid of the Kingdom of God.

The church was effectively and beautifully decorated for the occasion, the colors carrying out the color scheme of white and gold. A bowl of fifty daffodils was a feature of the decoration, and a banner in white and gold "1874-Jubilee-1924" was an outstanding feature. New hymn-boards and plant stands presented by the Ladies Auxiliary were used for the first time on this occasion and the glorious sunshine of a winter day added much to the programme of the celebration.

The choir under the efficient direction of Mrs. R. L. Eaton had been preparing for these services and in the presentation of the anthem, "Send Forth Thy Light" (Gounod) showed the result of the training which they had received. Miss Lois Porter presided at the organ, and a quartette composed of Mrs. S. S. Strong, Mr. Eaton and Messrs. Lamont and Walsh rendered beautifully "Spirit of God," by Gillette.

At the evening service Dr. Peterson was again the speaker, his subject being "Big vs. The Best." The sermon was an able one and was listened to with close attention. The music included an anthem, "Lift Up Your Hands" (Messiah), (Händel); Anthem "Hark Hark My Soul" (Shelley); Quartette, "How Long Will Thou Forget Me?" (Pfeuffer), sung by Mrs. Ross, Mrs. Eaton, Messrs. Lamont and Charlton; violin solo by E. Harrington; Miss Viola Bishop at the organ.

At the service on Monday evening Mr. S. S. Strong, one of the oldest members of the congregation, gave a very interesting history of the church, which was closely listened to by a large audience and greatly enjoyed. On behalf of himself and family Mr. Strong made the presentation of a handsome portrait of the first pastor, Rev. James Farber. This portrait was unveiled by his daughter, Mrs. S. E. DeWolfe, of New Minas. The thanks of the congregation were fittingly presented by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Ross. The address of the evening was delivered by Rev. J. D. Spidle, a former pastor, who spoke in a feeling manner of his connections with the church and its members, characterizing the ten years spent in Kentville as the most important of his ministry. In closing he spoke earnestly of what the future policy of the church should be. The music, as at the preceding services, was of a high order, and included an excellently rendered duet by Mrs. Eaton and Mr. Roy Walsh, entitled "The Lord is My Light," a mixed quartette, "Even Me" by Mrs. Ross, Mrs. Eaton and Messrs. Charlton and Lamont. The anthem, "Praise the Lord, O Jehovah," by the full choir, was given with pleasing effect.

A nominal membership fee of twenty-five cents was arranged for and it was provided that the age limit be from fifteen years.

The next meeting of the association will be on Tuesday evening, March 18th, at which meeting the organization will be completed.
