Diana was off St. John's Last Night

HEALTH AUTHORITIES ACTING.
Messages to Minister of Marine Stone yesterday from Capt. Parsons, of the Diana, stated the ship had been jammed from 10 o'clock the previous morning. Her position was not given but St. John's was stated to be the nearest port. Fifteen of the crew are very sick, but the others are improving. Mr. Oscar Howell, who is a druggist of 10 years experience and who is acting as doctor on board the ship, has pronounced the disease to be "flu," and has been instructed how to treat it by Dr. Campbell, who has made arrangements to have the sufferers placed in the Fever Hospital immediately on arrival, and the others of the crew will be isolated for some days to undergo observation. This we consider a very wise precaution against another outbreak of this dread disease at this season of the year would be fraught with serious consequences. It is believed no deaths have occurred, or it would have been mentioned in the messages. No word was received from the ship last night.

Sable I's Turnout

The work of discharging the Sable I's seals began yesterday afternoon, and at 6 p.m. 1,000 young harps, 250 young hoods and 140 old hoods had been landed. The harps average 49½ lbs. and the hoods 46 and 160 lbs. respectively. She will finish discharging this evening.

The storm experienced yesterday in the Gulf had the effect of loosening the ice and as a result the Kyle, which had been caught for some time off Low Point, ran clear and returned to North Sydney where she arrived at 7.30 p.m. and should leave again today with mails and passengers for Placentia.

An Excellent Lecture

Last night a large and very appreciative audience attended the Aula Maxima to hear Mr. H. F. Shortis lecture on "Our Oldest Customers". Mr. Shortis was introduced by Mr. C. W. Ryan, President of the Holy Name Society, under whose auspices the lecture was given; and in a few well chosen words referred to the ability of the lecturer and the interest which should attach to the subject matter of his address. Mr. Shortis used the diction which could only emanate from the scholar and handled the theme in a manner which drew hearty encomiums from all present. The subject was one with which few of the present generation could be conversant and afforded enlightenment to all who attended. In one audience were Rt. Rev. Monsignor McDermott, several of the clergy and Christian Brothers. Rev. Dr. Greene, Spiritual Director of the Society tendered the thanks of the organization to Mr. Shortis, who had made his mark in dealing with the history and traditions of Newfoundland and its people. He referred also to the revival of the Historical Society, and Mr. Shortis' past and present association with it, and believed men like the lecturer would contribute greatly to the historical education of the young engendering a true spirit of patriotism and love of their Island Home.

Seals Away South

Last week residents of the Cape St. Mary's shore took several young harp seals on the ice there. They were present in large numbers on the ice and but that a change of wind took the ice quickly off the coast the people would have killed thousands. This goes to show that the N. E. winds which prevailed the past three months have driven the main patch well to the south.

Most of the old time sealers in the city are of the opinion that the steamers Seal and Fogota will get full trips of seals. The former ship wants only a few thousand more to load and the latter is in a similar position. Both captains are persevering men and their crews are eager to fill the ships.

The heavy rain of the past few nights and days have swollen the rivers and smaller ponds considerably. The small streams running over the South Side Hills have been converted into torrents and in some instances have caused places in that section to be flooded.
