PUT MORE "PEP" IN THE CAMPAIGN!

Carleton County Must Show More Enthusiasm in Victory Loan or Lose Prestige

Two years ago the Town of Hartland and Brighton Parish led the county, and the county led the province in the matter of subscribing the Victory Loan. The present campaign offers the best and safest possible investment, and Canada at large will more than take the \$300,000,000 offered. But from present indications Carleton will fall away behind if she does not gain speed and do her part to the remaining few days that the campaign runs.

Will Carleton win the German Gun Trophy? If not, why not? Chairman T. O. Creighton writes The Observer with regard to the gun:

"I have taken this matter up with the members of the county committee, and suggested that instead of having the names of the committee and canvassers engraved on the gun, in case we are successful in winning it, that we have the names of the fallen heroes from Carleton county, who fell during the great war. The committee have agreed with me that it would be not only more appropriate, but it would also be more of an incentive for the public to subscribe toward the loan. I am enclosing you a statement of the standing throughout the county at the end of the first week of the campaign. The poor standing is no doubt due to a great extent to the fact that the recent election distracted the attention and efforts of a great percentage of our canvassers until it was over, and in some parishes they are just now getting squared away to

give the Victory Loan the required attention. I would appreciate very much if you would use the facts I have enclosed, putting them together in the proper way, and give us quite a write-up in your paper the next issue, on the general situation, with a view particularly to putting more enthusiasm into the parish of Brighton committee, as up to the present time they have not shown their usual enthusiasm and aggressiveness in this matter. I feel that if we can get the amount in the parish of Brighton which is allotted to them, we will be able to secure the allotment for the county."
