### LEFT NOTE TELLING

OF INTENDED CRIME

Victoria, B. C., September 6.

The painstaking manner in which

Chung Wong, slayer of Tang Hua

Lung, the visiting Chinese states-

man who was shot to death last Sun-

day night on Fisgard Street, made

his arrangements for the crime was

further exemplified yesterday when

the police came into possession of a

letter he left for his partner at the

barber shop at 1432 Government St.

The partner went over to Vancouver

on Saturday, intending to return on

Tuesday. When he came back there

was waiting him Chung Wong's last

communication to him. So far the

police have not been able to secure a

full translation of the document, but

enough is known of its contents to

show that Chung Wong wrote in-

forming his partner of his intention

to murder Tang Hua Lung and ex-

pressing the determination to end

his own life when his prospective

victim was done to death.

Copenhagen, Sept. 6.—Leon Tro-

tsky, the Bolshevik minister of war,

has been elected president of the

Russian supreme war council at a

meeting of the soviet executive com-

mittee, according to a Berlin Walsh

bureau dispatch from Moscow. The

Letish leader, Wazetsee, has been

elected commander-in-chief for all

the Russian fronts.

seconds, or 73 miles an hour.

## WORK OF THE BRITISH NAVY

LONDON, Sept. 5.—An idea of

the work of the Entente Allied navies

in European waters is shown by

figures on the part taken by Ameri-

can destroyers from one base in

April, May and June of this year,

which the Associated Press is now

permitted to disclose. These de-

stroyers, which form only a part of

America's fleet in European waters,

escorted 121 troopship convoys, con-

sisting of 773 ships, in that period.

During the same time they escorted

171 merchant convoys, consisting of

1,763 ships.

When it is considered that the

American Navy in that period did

only 27 per cent of the conveying,

and that the figures represent only

the work of destroyers at one base, it

may be seen what a tremendous task

is being performed by the Allied na-

valies.

General Debony's army is steadily ad-

vancing in the direction of Ham,

which has been completely encircled.

General Mangin's troops are now

in sight of Leon having reached pos-

itions within ten miles of that city.

General Berthelot's soldiers have

reached the Aisne on a large front.

Paris, Sept. 6.—1.30 p.m.—Gen-

eral Humbert's army is making

steady progress today in the region

of Guiscard and Ham. Advances from

the battlefield say that the town of

Ham has virtually been taken by the

French forces.

Paris, Sept. 6.—French troops

last night continued to push on-

ward on the entire front between

the Somme and the Vesle, says to-

day's War Office statement.

South of Peronne French troops

made further crossings of the Somme

in the region of Epeneourt. Far-

ther south the Ham-Peronne road

was reached at several points.

South of Ham the towns of Le

Plessis, Pette-d'Oie and Berlanourt

were captured, and still farther

south the French pursuing troops

pushed beyond Guivry, Gaillouet,

Crepiigny and Abbecourt.

In the region north of the Allette

French troops reached the outskirts

of Sinceny and the plateau north of

Landricourt and south of the Al-

lette the advancing forces got along
