WORK OF THE BRITISH NAVY

LEFT NOTE TELLING OF INTENDED CRIME
 Victoria, B. C., September 6.—The painstaking manner in which Chung Wong, slayer of Tang Hua Lung, the visiting Chinese statesman who was shot to death last Sunday night on Fisgard Street, made his arrangements for the crime was further exemplified yesterday when the police came into possession of a letter he left for his partner at the barber shop at 1432 Government St. The partner went over to Vancouver on Saturday, intending to return on Tuesday. When he came back there was waiting him Chung Wong's last communication to him. So far the police have not been able to secure a full translation of the document, but enough is known of its contents to show that Chung Wong wrote informing his partner of his intention to murder Tang Hua Lung and expressing the determination to end his own life when his prospective victim was done to death.

Copenhagen, Sept. 4.—Leon Trotsky, the Bolshevik minister of war, has been elected president of the Russian supreme war council at a meeting of the soviet executive committee, according to a Berlin wireless dispatch from Moscow. The Lethish leader, Waznetze, has been elected commander-in-chief for all the Russian fronts.

CHAUNAY IS IN HANDS OF THE FRENCH

(Continued from Page One)

General Debony's army is steadily advancing in the direction of Ham, which has been completely encircled. General Mangin's troops are now in sight of Leon having reached positions within ten miles of that city. General Berthelot's soldiers have reached the Aisne on a large front. Paris, Sept. 6.—1.30 p.m.—General Humbert's army is making steady progress today in the region of Guiscard and Ham. Advances from the battlefield say that the town of Ham has virtually been taken by the French forces.

Paris, Sept. 6.—French troops last night continued to push onward on the entire front between the Somme and the Vesle, says today's War Office statement.

South of Peronne French troops made further crossings of the Somme in the region of Epeneaucourt. Further south the Ham-Peronne road was reached at several points.

South of Ham the towns of Le Plessis, Patte-d'Oie and Berlancaourt were captured, and still farther south the French pursuing troops pushed beyond Guivry, Gailloiel, Crepigny and Abbecourt.

In the region north of the Allette French troops reached the outskirts of Sinceny and the plateau north of Landricourt and south of the Allette the advancing forces got along the Vauxvallon ravine.

The American troops advancing from the Vesle have captured the town of Glennes, southeast of Revilleon, and have advanced their line as far as the outskirts of Villers-en-Prayeres, on the Aisne.

The text of the statement reads: "In the course of the night we continued to advance on the entire front between the Somme and the Vesle. Our troops continued to cross the Somme in the region of Epeneaucourt, and farther south pushed forward at several points as far as the road from Ham to Peronne. South of Ham French troops occupied Le Plessis, Patte-d'Oie and Berlancaourt and passed beyond Guivry, Gailloiel, Crepigny and Abbecourt.

"North of the Allette we attained the approaches to Sinceny and the plateau north of Landricourt. South of the Allette we are along the Vauxvallon ravine.

"On the Vesle front American troops carried their lines as far as the outskirts of Villers-en-Prayeres and occupied Glennes."
