Toronto, Ont., July 3.—Chief Justice Meredith and Mr. Justice Moss this morning heard an action to compel the Hamilton Iron and Steel Company to register on the books of the company 150 shares of stock, which were originally issued to one W. V. Reynolds, but are now held by the Citizens' National Bank of Saratoga Springs. Reynolds was one of the promoters of the concern and secured his stock without making any payment on it. The Bank claims to have lent him \$7,800, taking the stock in security, and Reynolds died without redeming it. The company refuses to recognize the stock as it was not properly issued. The case was heard before Judge Street at Hamilton, and he held that the company could not be compelled to register the stock under the Canada statute, although the English law was different.
