Dastardly Proceedings of a Gang of Roughs

THE PASSENCERS TERROR-STRICKEN.

Inoffensive Negro the Cause of the Troubte.

Baltimore, Md., Dec. 25.—A most disgraceful riot took place, attended with violence and bloodshed, on a train which left Camden station on the Baltimore and Ohio Railway at 11.15 on Wedneedayinght. A few ninutes before the departure of the train a party of eight roughs hoarded it. They were evidently inflamed with liquor and determined on mischief. An inoffensive coloured man was seated in a car which they entered, and he at once became a victim of their violence. They drove him from the train and would not let him enter again. The train started immediately after this, and had gone but two squares when they discovered in one of the first cars another coloured man, whe, to escape a threatened beating, ran into the ladies car, closely followed by the roughs. A gentleman in the car saw the coloured man's danger, and closed the door between him and his pursuers, bolting it, and preventing them from entering on the instant. On the arrival of the train at Mount Winans, however, the roughs effected an entrance by breaking the glass in the car door, and drawing the bolt. On entering the car they assaulted the passengers right and left, making indiscriminate attacks upon all, unmindful of the frightened shrieks of the ladies and children. The roughs then drew pistols and fired in overy direction, regardless. rightened shricks of the ladies and children. The roughs then drew pistols and ired in overy direction, regardless of the consequences. The greatest error and consternation followed. Among the passengers many were prevented, with the greatest difficulty, from throwing themselves off the train while it was in motion. The stop at Mount Winans having been a brief one, the trainmen were mable to render any assistance, and all efforts to expel the rioters from the train before they arrived at their destination, the Relay House, were in vain. On arriving at that point, they left the train. A gentleman was exervely out in the face by a stick of wood. A coloured woman was shot in the neck. A number of passengers were bruised from blows and more or less injured. The passengers on the train recognized several of the roughs, which may lead to the arrest and punishment of the entire gang.
