At the public meeting held yesterday afternoon in the Council Chamber it was decided by the ladies and gentlemen present to form a Reparation League in this city, which would include representatives from points in the county also for the purpose of carrying on work in connection with the meeting of returning soldiers, setting them back into civil pursuits and otherwise looking after their interests. On motion Mr. W. R. Robertson was named chairman and Mr. Leo Cunningham secretary, pro tem. Another meeting will be held at the same place on Friday afternoon of this week to complete details for a large public meeting to be held in the Opera House if possible on the evening of April 6th. At that time it is hoped to have present able speakers from Toronto to outline the services that such a league can perform.

The number of machines embraced in the consignment was not made public, but they were listed as valued at \$319,000.
