Check Swindlers Were Nabbed Just as They Were Getting Ready

Cheques Made Out to Catch the Unwary St. Catharines Merchant Found on Them— Passed Some at Niagara Falls and Are Also Wanted at St. Thomas, London and Other Places

A young couple were arrested by the police on Saturday afternoon just as they were ready to start out on the mission which brought them to the city, that of relieving sundry unsuspecting merchants or surplus goods.

Chief Greene got word from Niagara Falls, Ont., that a man and woman had that morning passed worthless cheques in that city on various merchants, the method being to buy some goods and tender a worthless cheque in payment, receiving the change in cash. How much they gathered up in this way from the credulous Falls business men, was not stated.

The couple were found in a local hotel and were locked up. They gave their names as Leola Greenwood and Stanley West. They had a marriage certificate indicating that they were man and wife. The woman had married a man named Greenwood in August but it seems had only staid with him about a month, when she appears to have taken up with West.

In the possession of the couple was a number of cheques for various amounts which were to be passed in St. Catharines merchants. These cheques, the police said today were drawn up by the woman prisoner and they are holding her on remand till Friday on a charge of forgery.

Brother Did Not Appear, So General's Case Was Enlarged

James Grant, better known as "General," appeared before the Magistrate today charged that he did unlawfully shoot at one Arthur Grant with intent to kill on March 4th.

The brother Arthur, had evidently forgotten his engagement and didn't answer to his name when called so the case was enlarged until tomorrow morning.

Police Asked That Badges Be Taken Off

Russians Paraded Two Hundred Strong at the Funeral of Their Compatriot.

The funeral of the Russian, Samuel Mazuranto took place on Sunday afternoon from the Russian Hall, on Paer street, and was largely attended. The service was conducted at the hall and grave side by a Russian associate from Brantford. The service over at the hall the cortege proceeded to the cemetery headed by two Russian friends of deceased who carried a large wreath with the late Mr. Mazuranto's name inscribed, then the 19th band, followed by over two hundred members of the society which took charge of the funeral. At the rear of the cortege were two motors conveying the lady friends who took an active part in the service.

The men in the parade wore red badges but took them off at the request of Chief Greene. Today the Chief said the reason for this was that while the badges might not mean anything harmful, at the same time it was getting in the thin edge of the wedge and if allowed might mean trouble later when other parades wished to carry flags or wear some kind of emblem the meaning of which was not clear.

Allied Powers Will Warn the Turks to Cease Massacres

Demonstration to Be Made on the Bosphorous to Bring the Turks to Time—Will Be Followed By Drastic Action if Hint is Not Taken.

LONDON, March 8.—The allied Government yesterday. The terms of the communication were not disclosed but it is understood they are drastic and will be followed by drastic action should the necessity arise.

The proposed allied military control of Constantinople is not to be an occupation in the sense which that term usually implies, according to the Peace Conference plans, which, however, have not as yet been fully matured.

The idea of the Conference, it is indicated, is to impress upon the Turks that the world will not tolerate massacres such as those of the Armenians and Cilicia last month. This has been unsuccessfully attempted through threats from the Conference that unless the massacres ceased the peace terms for Turkey would be much more severe than otherwise, and now the allies plan to make some sort of a military demonstration at Constantinople. Just what this form shall take is understood not to have been decided, but a speedy decision is expected as Great Britain, France and Italy are agreed that quick action is necessary to save hundreds of lives.

Although the Premier are not attending the sessions just now, the Peace Conference as it is now constituted has full powers to rearrange the outline of the Turkish treaty within a fortnight, but the conference are not planning to hurry with the document, now that the reports of the massacres have been confirmed. Their attitude is that the Turks must conform to the European interpretation of civilized Government before any treaty shall be handed to them.

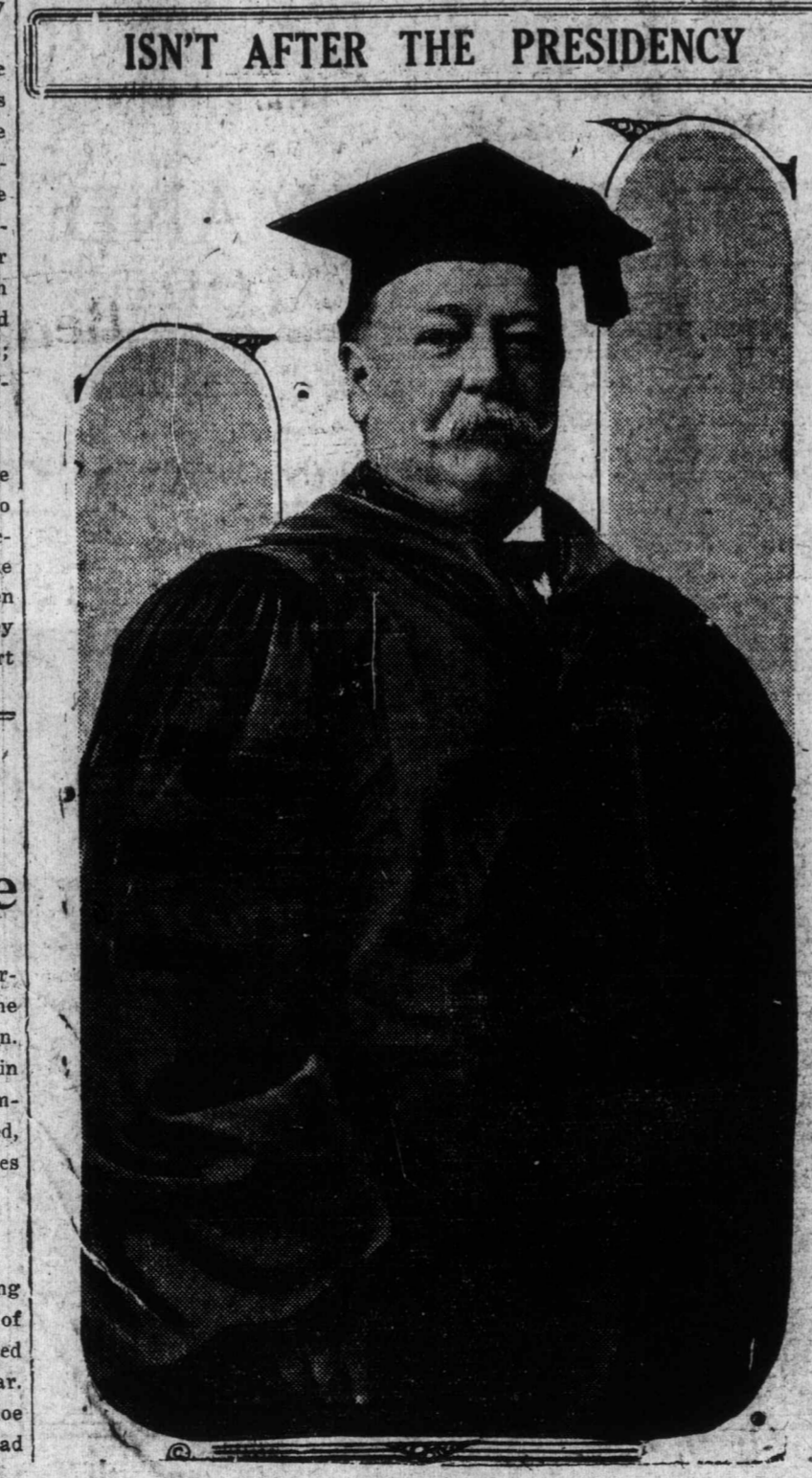

BERLIN, March 8.—A French officer was beaten and thrown out of the Adlon, the leading hotel of Berlin, last night, by an enraged mob of Chauvinistic guests because he refused to stand while the orchestra played "Deutschland Uber Alles."

The instigator of the affair was a Hohenzollern, Prince Joachim-Albert of Prussia, who was in disfavour with his Royal relatives several years before the war on account of his marriage with an actress.

Finally the bolder spirits, wielding chairs, broke through the ring of waiters about the table and dragged the French officer out by the collar. One excited guest took off his shoe and beat the Frenchman over the head with it.

THE WEATHER

Mr. Mosher read the Anglican service at the graveside. The following acted as bearers: F. Boucher, Albert Halstead, F. Cusford Emanuel Clayton, Gil Ward, William Duke. The numerous floral tributes from sympathizing friends were very beautiful. The remains were interred in the family plot in Victoria Lawn Cemetery.

Benzine Explosion in Toronto Wipes Out a Family of Four People

TORONTO, March 8.—The explosion of a can of benzine, followed by a fire, caused the death of four persons at Nos. 8 and 10 Moscow ave. yesterday afternoon at 12.50. The dead are:

HERBERT FOSTER, aged 36.
ALICE FOSTER, aged 39.

Their two children, Aileen, aged 7 and Olive, aged 5.

The entire family was wiped out by the explosion and fire, and the whole progress of the tragedy occupied the space of only half an hour. Herbert Foster survived until seven o'clock, dying in the General Hospital from his injuries.

Yesterday afternoon the charred kitchen and badly damaged lower floor of the brick veneer and rough-cast building were the only evidences of the grim occurrence of an hour or so before. A doll's baby carriage, belonging to one of the children burned to death, the gutted interior of the kitchen, an overturned and burned table lying in the centre of the kitchen were mute witnesses of the disaster which overtook the Foster family as they were preparing to eat the midday meal. Lying in the kitchen, where death had held sway, was the scorched and blackened roast of beef upon which the family were preparing to dine.

Exploded Can Found.

So far as can be learned, Foster, who ran a little tailoring and repair shop at No. 10 Moscow avenue, was trying to fit a spout in a can of benzine. The spout had evidently become loose, and had fallen out. When the room was investigated after the fire the spout, held in a pair of pliers, was still resting in the cook stove, evidently heating so that solder could be applied. The exploded five gallon can was also found, bent and twisted with the force of the explosion.

The only details of the tragedy come from Mrs. Phyllis Spicer, who with her husband and two little children, occupied rooms upstairs. The kitchen where the tragedy took place is a one story frame structure attached to the rear of the main two story building. The entrance to it is narrow, and runs out at the left hand side of the room, while another passageway turns at right angles to lead to the passageway into the two small shops. From this passageway the stairs turn up to the left, and a side door opens out of the corridor into a lane, nearly opposite the stairway.
