Mrs. Grieves gave him the key; he tried the lock, but failing to move the bolts handed her back the key, saying "I can't unlock it," then attempted to rise to his feet; but fell over upon the floor and expired instantly. There was not the slightest appearance of a struggle, although some blood flowed from his mouth. Dr. Frank M. Brown was at once sum moned, but there was nothing that he or any person else could do to restore life. Mrs. Smiler was at that time at the wharf
