LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

A SERIOUS outbreak of smallpox is said to have taken place at Plover Island, Ont. The Government of Quebec have granted \$500 to fund night schools in Montreal.

SEVERAL cases of smallpox have been discovered in Boston, the first for over a year.

The bolts and nut works and Pender's new mill works, St. John, N. B., are coming at night to overtake orders.

At Huntington, P. Q., on the 18th inst., John McPherson, aged 81 years, was found to death by a bull while crossing a field.

ACCIDENTS confirmed on board and city persons in St. Mary's Cathedral, Halifax, on Sunday last.

The **Princess Line steamer** Maraca is on her way from Hall, England, to St. John, N. B., with a cargo of 2,000 tons of steel rails.

According to the Halifax Herald, it had potatoes retail in that city at 44 cents; bairns 32 cents; plus 40 to 42 cents per bushel.

The King of Portugal died on Saturday last. The Duke of Beagnana, eldest son of the King, who succeeded to the throne, will assume the title of Carlos I.

WILLIAM WETTERMAN died at Grand Rapids, Wisconsin, a few days ago, aged one hundred and fourteen years. He married his second wife when he was in his hundredth year.

The mission by the Redeemers' Fathers announced to begin in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on yesterday, will commence, instead, on Sunday next. Five Fathers are expected here on Saturday evening.

PATRICK GARNETT, aged seventy-eight, years, died suddenly of heart disease while attending Mass in St. Peter's Church, St. John, N. B., on Sunday morning last. He was kneeling down when he died.

A **BLAZE** of wooden buildings opposite the Chatham Railway Station, Ottawa, was burned on Sunday night last. About twenty families are left homeless by the fire.

ALGERMAN BURTON of Montreal has taken a \$100,000 action against Alderman Stephen, ex-M. P. F., for asserting that the former was not entitled to a seat in the City Council.

The steamer **Dorchester**, which arrived at Halifax a day or two ago, had a very rough passage, having encountered a very heavy gale, which lasted four days. Part of her cargo shifted, and two of her crew were injured.

A **MAN** named Bishop was nearly blown away in Halifax a few days ago, by drinking the liquid of Stramonium leaves, instead of inhaling the smoke from them, as a cure for asthma. The doctor with difficulty saved his life.

The town of Curtis, Wisconsin, on the line of the Central Railroad, containing between 200 and 300 inhabitants, was burned down a few days ago. Loss over \$100,000. Its principal industries were lumber and hay.

It is said that about four hundred cases of fever and forty deaths occurred among the twelve hundred workmen of the New York Central Railway at West Albany during the past few months. The epidemic is attributed to defective drainage.

A **FOURTY** year old man named Present, employed in the Montreal rolling mills, was caught, on the 16th, in a large wheel, whirled around several times in the air, and thrown on the floor a horrible mass of fish and bones. Death took place instantly.

FREARS are entertained for the safety of the United States steamer **Thetis**, thought to be in the lee north of Point Barrow. The steamer **Bea** was sailing at Omakchak, Alaska, a few days ago, preparatory to going in search of her.

DURING a severe storm near Farmington, Utah, a Denver and Rio Grande passenger train was struck by a snow pile of wind and glass cars overturned. Seventy passengers were in the cars, but only three were seriously injured.

MATTHEW TRYBALLE, who had been a clerk in Clarke's fancy store, in Montreal, for eighteen years, was drowned at Chatham, P. Q., on the 16th inst. He jumped into the river to swim out to a boat which had drifted into the stream, and was chilled and sunk.

The steamer **Carroll**, Captain Brown, arrived from Boston via Halifax early Sunday morning. She had the usual good catch and the following passengers: Prof. H. P. McCormack, Miss A. S. Marshall, Miss Nellie Carroll, Miss Edie Blane, Mr. Ernest Crockett, Miss McMillan, Mr. S. W. Snow, Mr. Charles Nelson, Mr. H. G. Chase, Mr. M. Young, Miss Emma Chisholm.

A **MAY** named William Hennessey was arrested in South Boston on the 20th Sept. last, for murdering his wife on the previous night in a most horrible manner. Both Hennessey and his wife formerly belonged to this city. Mrs. Hennessey was twenty-two years of age, and had a very good reputation among her neighbors. Details are supposed to be at the bottom of the article. Hennessey was a better maker and worked at his trade in South Boston. They had three children.

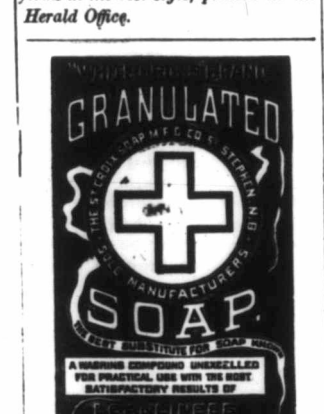
