The Provincial Election

Elsewhere in this issue will be found an account of the polling, in the different sections of the Province, at the general Provincial election held on Wednesday last. The figures given indicate the return of 10 Conservatives and 20 Liberals. The Commissioner of Public Works is defeated, according to the figures given, and the Premier had only six votes in his favor at the close of the polls. Whether or not the special votes will make any change in either or both these cases will be known on declaration day. These two gentlemen were the head and front of the Liberal political machine and the people by their votes have shown their utter disregard for them. It seems, on the face of it, a most extraordinary thing that a majority of Government supporters should have been elected, in view of the political corruption and malfeasance of the administration. The mal-administration of the Government and their numerous political sins of commission and omission; their outrageous and ruinous management of the Provincial finances, by which we are reduced to the verge of bankruptcy; all these were made plain to the electorate through the press and at the public meetings; but in the face of this overwhelming evidence of condemnation, they managed to secure a new lease of power. The result shows that a majority of the people did not vote for the candidates on the merits of the administration, or through conviction; but in virtue of some ulterior motives. It is quite evident that the Government and their friends labored hard to divert public attention from the real questions at issue, and to induce certain electors to vote from interested motives, rather than otherwise. Unfortunately for the Province, as the election results show, they suc-

ceeded only too well. While conditions of this kind obtain, it will be very difficult to effect any improvement in the Provincial political situation. The general result furnished several surprises. Prince County, which had elected a Conservative to the Federal Parliament on November 3rd, did not return one Conservative at the Provincial election on Wednesday. Queen's, also, which returned two Conservatives to the House of Commons, only elected two Oppositionists on Wednesday. But King's County, which returned the only Liberal from the Province at the Federal election, elected eight if not nine, supporters of Mr. Matheson at the Local election. If the people are satisfied with the kind of Government given them by the present Liberal combination, no doubt they will get enough of it.

Death of Mr. P. J. Trainor.

It is with the deepest regret that we chronicle the death of Mr. P. J. Trainor, Barrister of this city, which occurred under sad circumstances on Monday evening or Tuesday morning of last week. He was last seen alive about 8 o'clock Monday evening and his dead body was found about 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, near the foot of Dorchester Street on the shore, about 30 yards from the pumping station of the Water and Sewerage supply. The evidence at the Coroner's inquest and the verdict of the jury indicate that the deceased was overtaken while in this section of the city, by an epileptic fit and before recovering was drowned or suffocated. Deceased was a son of Mr. Peter Trainor of Kingston, and leaves to mourn his sorrowing parents, brothers and sisters. He taught school for some years and subsequently studied law in the office of Mr. W. S. Stewart of this city. After his admission to the bar, nearly two years ago, he entered into partnership with Mr. Eneas A. McDonald, and continued a member of the law firm of McDonald and Trainor till the time of his death. He was one of the most eloquent and pleasing platform orators in this Province, and had addressed many public meetings in the recent Federal and Provincial campaigns, on behalf of the Liberal-Conservatives, of which party he was a shining light. He was an extremely clever young man; he was genial and well liked by all his acquaintances and had a brilliant future in store for him, had his life been spared. His remains were taken to the home of his parents, whence the funeral took place on Friday to the Catholic Church and Cemetery at St. Anne's, Lot 65. The funeral cortege was one of the largest ever seen in that part of the country, the procession of carriages was about a mile long. The pall bearers were selected from delegations from the Benevolent Irish Society and the Knights of Columbus of Charlottetown, who were in attendance. Of both these societies deceased had been a member. R.I.P.

New Governor General Arrives.

Our new Governor-General, the Right Honorable, the Earl Grey, accompanied by his Countess, family and suit arrived at Halifax early on Saturday morning on board the Steamer Parisian. After the usual preliminaries the Vice Regal party landed at 10.30 o'clock Saturday forenoon. His Excellency was received by Hon. R. W. Scott, representing the Prime Minister of Canada, and other Cabinet Ministers and by Major General Sir Charles Parsons, commanding the Imperial forces at Halifax. The party repaired to the Legislative Council Chamber where the Governor-General was sworn in by Mr. Justice Sedgewick, acting for the Chief Justice of Canada. After the inaugural ceremonies, a state banquet was held at Government House and a reception in the Council Chamber. Other festivities were indulged in Federal, Provincial and Civic officialdom participating. After duly spending Sunday at Halifax the Vice Regal party left for Ottawa Sunday night.

Obituary.

This market was fairly well attended and stocked yesterday. Pork was a shade on the up grade, 5¢ cents was the ruling price; but in some instances 3¢ cents were paid. Oats were 39 to 40 cts a bushel. Straw was as high as \$10 a ton and hay was \$14.

Insurrection in St. Petersburg.

An anti-Government demonstration planned for Sunday at St. Petersburg resulted in one of the fiercest riots in some years. Despite the warnings printed in all the papers through the people gathered near the Cathedral and the Police were compelled to make extensive preparations against any disturbance. All warnings were fruitless and at a signal given by the waving of a red flag enormous crowds shouted "Down with autocratic rule!" Hundreds of red flags appeared and the populace moved towards the palace demanding the calling of a convention to consider constitutional Government. Students of both sexes joined the mob. Rides of police appeared and endeavored to keep back the tide of humanity when suddenly a squadron of Cossacks appeared and charged mob slashing right and left with their sabres. The front rank of the revolutionists stood for only a few moments but the Cossacks continued slashing until blood flowed freely and hundreds were wounded. The incident, which assumed great proportions is regarded most seriously.
