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EDMONTON FACES VERY SERIOUS COAL FAMINE

Dealers Refuse to Accept Further Orders—Situation in More Serious Here Than in South of Province Says Inspector of Mines.

Edmonton is experiencing a temporary coal famine. The sudden advent of severe cold weather last week has resulted in such a demand for coal that local dealers are not able to begin to furnish an adequate supply.

John T. Sterling, the provincial inspector of mines, issues a word of warning and advice to the Edmonton public. Mr. Sterling informed the Bulletin yesterday that he regarded the coal shortage in this part of the province as more real and serious than in the south.

Railroads of the United States Kill 10,396 and Injure 150,159 in 1911.

Washington, Nov. 11.—Casualties on the railroads of the country during the year which ended June 30, 1911, are shown in a report issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission today as 10,396 killed and 150,159 injured. Of this number 439 killed and 7,287 injured are classed under the head of "industrial accidents," which do not involve the movement of cars or engines on rails.

Bulletin Special. Scrivenville, Alta., Nov. 11.—R. G. Brown, Thos. Evans, Archer Benson, James Clelland and Geo. Reid, who quit work at the Alberta Coal company's mine at Cardiff, on November 9th, are summoned before Inspector Worsley, Edmonton, for Monday morning, charged with an infringement of the Lemieux act, the penalty for which is ten dollars per day for every day the mine is idle owing to the strike.

IMMIGRATION PASSED ALL FORMER RECORDS GREAT DISCONTENT PERVADES GERMANY

Figures for This Year Will Show 375,000, or Increase of 50,000—American Immigration Lowest on Record—145,000 This Year, 151,000 Last.

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—That the immigration into Canada for this year will pass all records and will touch 375,000 or an increase of at least 50,000, and that the American immigration will also be the largest on record, reaching 145,000, as compared with 121,000 last year, were the statements made tonight by W. D. Scott, solicitor-general of Canadian immigration and J. G. Gowan, secretary of the immigration agencies in the States and located in Chicago, who was in the city today.

Premier Sifton Will Offer for Approval Comprehensive Policy Details Withheld Till House Meets—Session of Legislature Not Expected to be Very Prolonged.

It is announced by Premier Sifton that the government will have an ample and well defined policy of northern railway construction to present to the House when it meets. The details of the policy will not be divulged until then, but the general scheme is to provide for the opening up by railroads, to the fullest extent possible at the present time, of the resources of the undeveloped north country. Northern development is one of the principal subjects which will be brought forward for consideration by the government at the approaching session of the legislative assembly. And there is no doubt but that the hinterland of Edmonton will receive its due.
