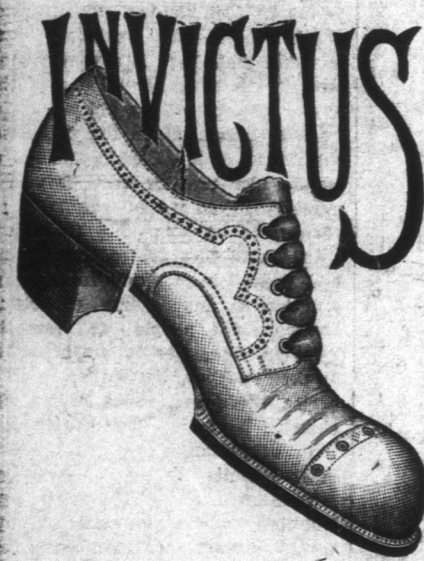


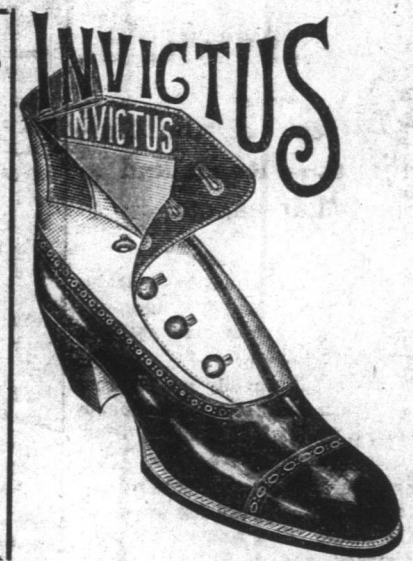

## Royal Messages.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 10. While the rulers and representatives of foreign nations are assembling for the funeral of the dead Sovereign, the various necessary formalities incident to the sad event are being gradually completed. The widowed Queen has sent a touching personal message to the nation, written in an unassuming style and recalling similar intimate messages which Queen Victoria was in the habit of addressing to her subjects. King George has addressed messages to the navy and army, expressing his thanks for their loyalty and his solicitude for the efficiency of both services. A message also has gone from the King to the Indian Princes and people, expressing his profound gratitude for their sympathy.

## Message of Sympathy.

The following cable message was sent to the Queen, who is the Patron of the G.F.S. "The Girls' Friendly Society in Newfoundland respectfully tender sincere sympathy to Her Majesty." The reply received is as follows:—"Girls' Friendly Society Newfoundland. Queen Alexandra sends grateful thanks for kind sympathy."

## Festival of Empire.

## Resolutions of Condolence

From the St. John's T. A. & B. Society. Yesterday afternoon William J. Ellis, President, and George Coughlan, Secretary of the St. John's T. A. & B. Society, waited upon His Excellency the Governor and submitted the following Resolutions of Condolence for transmission to the Royal Family. His Excellency received the deputation very kindly and promised to forward the resolutions as soon as possible:

To His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams, K.C.M.G. Your Excellency—

Whereas it has pleased Providence in its wisdom to call from amongst his devoted and loyal subjects our Most Gracious Sovereign, King Edward VII., by whose demise the British Empire is deprived of a wise and prudent Sovereign, whose virtues and statesmanship had earned for him the recognition of the world at large; And Whereas this Colony of Newfoundland, the most ancient and loyal dependency of the British Crown, feels itself particularly bereaved by the loss of a Sovereign, who had in a special sense endeared himself to its people by the keen interest he had always displayed in its affairs since his memorable visit here fifty years ago;

Be it therefore Resolved that the St. John's Total Abstinence and Benefit Society in full meeting assembled hereby desire to place upon record an expression of the sincere sorrow at the sudden and untimely demise of our beloved King, and to express in common with British subjects throughout the vast dominions that encircle the globe, its poignant grief at the loss of the nation and the world will sustain in being deprived of the benign influence for domestic government and international concord of the great and kindly soul now at rest; Be it also Resolved that the Society request His Excellency the Governor

to convey to the Royal Family its sentiment of sincere and loving sympathy with the distressed circle in the great void created by the demise of His late Majesty and the loss the Empire has sustained in the unexpected passing away of the Statesman-King. Be it further Resolved that the Society renew on behalf of his present Majesty, King George V., son and successor to our late revered King, its homage and fealty towards his person and throne of the British Sovereign, and prays that the same graces and benign attributes of the kingly office which were so strongly exemplified in the national record of His late Majesty may continue to exercise their beneficent influence with his successor, for the good and peace of the world, and the happiness and welfare of the increasing millions of his subjects throughout the British Empire.

## Complains of Neglect.

Editor Evening Telegram: Sir.—It is a recognized fact that the tendency in the City of St. John's is westward. Within the past few years the western part of the city is being rapidly built up. This is quite natural, seeing that new industries are yearly developing there. Yet there is very little encouragement held out to industrious people who try to build a home for themselves. If a man purchase or lease a plot of land in this section and applies to the Council for a street line, he is sure to meet with a curt reply from the City Fathers, implying that they do not recognise such and such a street, with the result that what should be the most beautiful part of the city is being built up without any regard to order or uniformity, and will in a few years be an eye-sore to visitors to our town. As I before remarked all previous Councilors have entirely ignored St. John's West and the northern section of this city, and in this connection I venture to assert, that the prospective Councilor who will pledge himself to remedy this evil, and procure more satisfaction for those who have already homes, or are about to build them in the western section will roll up a larger vote in the coming election than has been polled in any previous Municipal election. I shall have something further to say on this subject with your permission, Mr. Editor, in a future letter.

## War Imminent.

Special to Evening Telegram. LIMA, Peru, May 10. Active preparations are being made for a possible war with Ecuador. Volunteers are enlisting daily and the war fund is being constantly increased by private donations in this city and its immediate vicinity. Some 24,000 soldiers are quartered, while 10,000 additional troops are stationed near the frontier. The Peruvian Government believes that it has no table information that an effort is being made by Ecuador to obtain an alliance with Bolivia, as against Peru. To this end it is asserted a member of the Moudorian Cabinet left Guayaquil today for La Paz, Bolivia under instructions to negotiate with the Bolivian Government and the Chilean Minister at that Capital.

## In the Throne Room.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 10. Late to-night the body of King Edward enclosed in an oaken casket was transferred to the Throne Room of Buckingham Palace, where it rests on a catafalque, covered with the same purple pall which enshrouded the coffin of Queen Victoria. A silk Royal Ensign has been spread over the pall.

## New York Mourns.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, N.Y., May 10. Resolutions of condolence on the death of King Edward were adopted to-day by the Board of Aldermen of New York, and as an additional mark of respect the Board adjourned.

## Mayor Gibbs Retires.

A meeting of Mr. Gibbs' old committee took place last night in the Star Hall to hear him give his reasons for retiring from the Mayoralty contest. Owing to the many other duties that he had to attend to he said that he was unable to give that time and attention to the City Council which in his opinion would be necessary in order to secure the best results. Many of his friends had asked him to seek re-election and he had called the meeting in order to satisfy them that the reasons he had for not taking part in the coming contest were such as they also would agree with. About 500 voters were present and Mr. J. Giles occupied the chair. The Mayor's address was a lengthy one. He gave an interesting statement of the financial condition of the Council and showed up all the difficulties that had to be contended in carrying on the work with such limited means. The total civic revenue is now about \$175,000, while the expenditure is nearly \$160,000. This leaves a small amount for the many requirements of the city. The exact figures of the city debt are:—

The recent loan had put the amount of interest to be paid yearly by the city up to \$46,302. The total amount of revenue which the Council estimated might be collected this year from the property tax was only \$55,325. Mayor Gibbs then went on to speak on the sanitary condition of the city. Improvements were necessary but there was no money to make them. The high death rate, especially amongst children, could only be checked by having more civil improvements as regards sanitation. The City Council had no money to do the work and the citizens were not taking that interest in the situation which its gravity demanded.
