Henry Candley KILLED AT MOUNT PEARL THIS MORNING.

Warrant Officer Henry Candley, of the Royal Navy, attached to the Mount Pearl Marconi Station, met death by accident at an early hour this morning when he was struck by an electric discharge. Particulars of the sad happening are not yet available as an inquiry is being held and the exact cause of death will probably be made known to-morrow.
