





Hints For Housewives.

If the edges of a sausepan are well buttered the contents will not boil

To prevent a mustard plaster from blistering, grease the skin before applying.

When boiling common starch sprinkle in a little fine salt; it will prevent it from sticking. Vinegar and salt are excellent for

cleaning brass. Allow two tablespoonfuls of salt to half a pint of Fast boiling makes meat hard and

indigestible, while gentle simmering will make even the cheapest cuts as tender as the most expensive ones. To whiten handkerchiefs which

have become a bad color through careless washing, soak them for a night in a solution of pipeclay in warm water. Wash and boil them the following day in the usual way.
